Hospital Will Require 150 Nurses**

With the likelihood that tenders will be called for the first stage of the Richmond Hill's projected hospital early in March, interest in other facets of hospital administration is warming up.

For instance, while it may be a year or more before their services are required, eventually 150 to 160 nurses will be needed for the 126-bed first stage. Approximately 100 of these will be entitled to put R.N. (registered nurse) after their names. The remainder will be certified nursing assistants and other aides.

Four or five laboratory technicians will be needed as soon as the hospital swings into operation, plus four or more x-ray technicians. These are only a few of the many professions and occupations which will find local employment when the hospital becomes a reality. Incidentally, a number of nurses living in Richmond Hill who are now going to work elsewhere, either as
