She reported improvements were being made in medical care and living conditions.

The narrow roads are crowded with bicycles, donkey carts and people walking, but no streets are paved, said Mrs. Hiscocks. In such a hot climate, 80 degrees was considered cool.

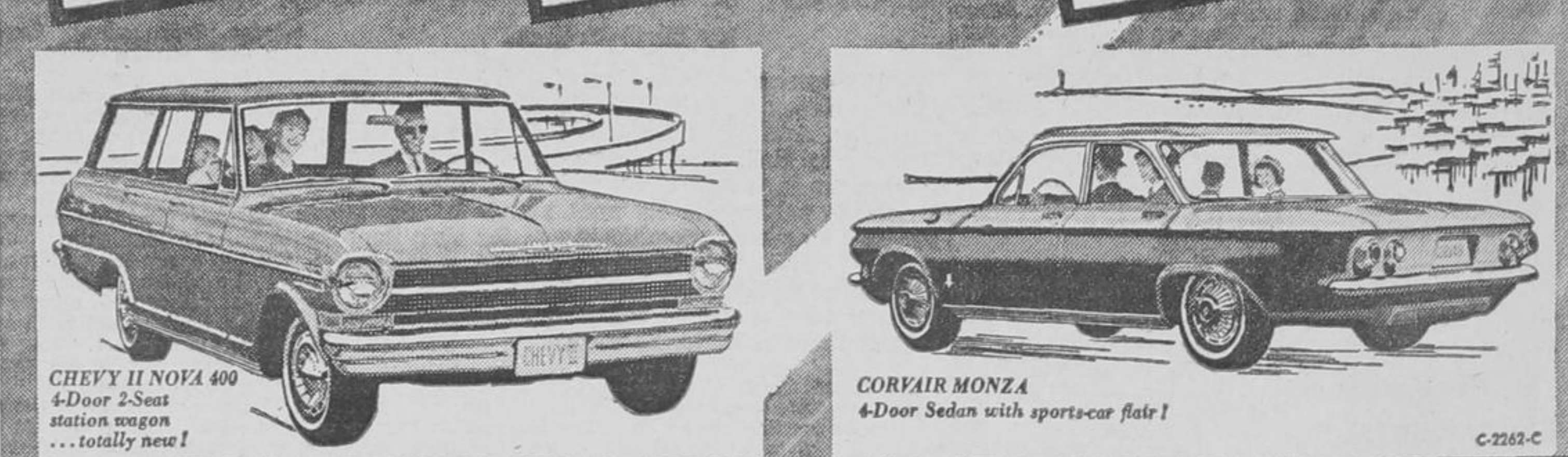
