Name Works Inspector For Markham Township

The increase in building in Markham Township has resulted in an expansion of the municipality's engineering staff. On recommendation of the township's engineer, "Dusty" Miklas, a works inspector, who will double as a trenching safety inspector, was appointed by township council last week.

Mr. Russell Mills, who will receive a salary of \$5.500 annually, is leaving the service of North York Township, where he has been chief inspector of sub-divisions.

All members of council favoured the appointment which was made at a hastily called special meeting, with Councillor Charles Hoover dissenting. He felt that more information should have been secured first.
