A cordial invitation is extended to everyone in Maple and surrounding districts, to join with these bible classes at this special service.



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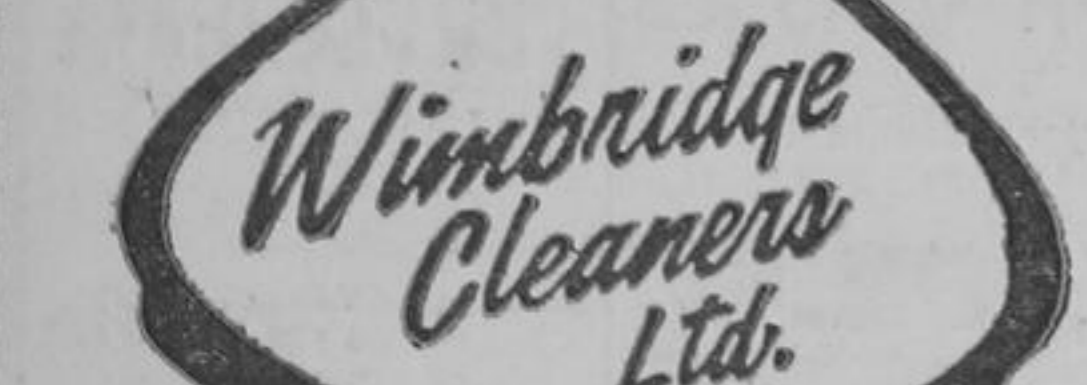

Cancer Film at Auxiliary
Keeping in step with April's Canadian Cancer Campaign month, the 1st Maple Boy Scout Ladies' Auxiliary has invited the education chairman, of Maple Branch Cancer Society, Mrs. Velma Rutherford, to present one of the latest, and indeed timely films "Time and Two Women".

A quote from Mr. Maurice Grimes, Executive Director of Ontario Division, "One of the most challenging programmes relating to the Cancer Society since its inception has now been given to us in the form of a film known as "Time and Two Women". This film concerns itself with the early diagnosis of cancer of the cervix and uterus. We are told that if we can establish the practise of regular periodic check-ups, it is entirely possible that the cure rate of this site of cancer can be increased greatly and highly likely, if this programme could be developed over a period of two years, where every woman in the community has a smear taken, this form of cancer could be wiped out as a cause of death among women", unquote.

With the thought that this film should be made available for all the women of Maple and district to see, the Auxiliary is inviting all women's church groups, community groups, women's Institutes and women from all branches of this community to join with them on April 25, at 8:30 p.m. at the Maple Community Hall. fields look green which prompted Eric and Erica Kneisel of Jackson Avenue, Maple, to purchase their own property in the British West Indies but when Erica travelled with a group of Canadians recently on a 17 day excursion to see "their land" first hand — she was completely sold on it. Montserrat is a remote island south of Antigua - the honeymoon spot of Princess Margaret and Anthony. There are 12,000 inhabitants, mostly natives but there have been more "tourists" in the last few months than over the last two years!

Although the accommodation is at this point somewhat primitive, the island is encouraging Canadian tourists to visit and perhaps buy land so as to improve the standard of living. A development company is improving the tomato and sugar plantations and are putting in roads and expect to have the first houses erected this month. Erica flew as a guest in a private plane over neighbor islands and noted they were covered in jungle. Her island, she found, was most friendly and helpful to the tourist and a large hotel is being built on the Atlantic Ocean side.

The government is directed by the Queen and Erica and her travelling companions were invited to dinner with the chief minister, Honorable Mr. Bramble, who is a native.

Wishing to see and find out all she could about the living conditions, especially for her father who wants to settle there, Erica found there are about 300 motor cars on the island and most of the food is imported. In the local market a dozen eggs cost the equivalent of \$1.61 of our money!

Its terrain is quite mountainous with many springs. As there is always a breeze, there is no humidity. Because of the volcano on the island, the sand is dark, —the scenery is beyond description and a comforting thought is that there are no hurricanes. The island government is interested in the English school system and Erica noted the school girls all wore uniforms. They have radio and a weekly paper.

All in all her stay at Montserrat was all she had hoped for as she brought back her glowing report to her family, husband Eric and her daughter Margaret — her father surely agreed she had been a good scout in his behalf. Now the neighbors of the Kneisel family can just sit back and wait for the time when we'll all be invited to their ocean front home for its "house warming" on romantic Montserrat Island in the British West Indies!

It seems the staff of St. Clair Y.M.C.A. in talking to Mr. Elliott, asked if there were any maple sugar bushes around Maple where a group of children might visit and see first hand how maple sugar is made. A phone call to Mr. Bert Robson on 7th line, Vaughan, brought the answer "We make it right here and will be delighted to have a few young people come to see it made."

This call was on a Thursday morning, by afternoon the Y.M.C.A. staff was informed and they in turn sent out letters to inform the young people of the outing.

It was expected that about 35 would respond and arrangements made accordingly. Imagine the red faces of the Y staff when no less than 82 put in an appearance but they were all loaded into buses and off to Bert Robson's farm.

None of the visitors knew Bert previously but that was remedied in no time flat as he met them at the gate with tractor and hay wagons full of hay and transported them to the sugar bush.

A good time was had by all. The youngsters drank the sap, put snowballs in the boiling syrup to hastily dip them out and eat them. Some of the boys insisted on firing up the enormous fire under the heavy pots — the result being that the sap got a more severe boil than usual.
