Lady Baden-Powell spoke of the importance of public relations in the organization and said how once it was a "small band of do-gooders" but since Girl Guides is a world wide organization financial assistance is often needed. To ask the general public for funds creates interest and herein is an opportunity.

At the risk of "stepping on some toes" she spoke of more "collaboration" in this country, between the Boy Scouts and the Girl Guides, "at a higher level". Then with a twinkle in her eye she told of a jamboree of thousands somewhere in India where thousands of Scouts and Guides were in the same encampment.
