### Opinions Radically Changed

## Town Will Continue To Support Toronto Industrial Commission

Members of Richmond Hill Town Council who were originally critical of the fact that the town made an annual contribution of \$500 to the Metropolitan Toronto Industrial Commission had changed their mind as to the value of the organization. It was revealed at town council meeting.

Mayor James Haggart and Councillor John MacDiarmid recently visited the Commission's office in Toronto and in recent days, Mr. William Wilson, general manager of the commission, had paid a visit to a meeting of the Richmond Hill Industrial Commission. The work of the Toronto body was explained and it was pointed out that it covered not only Toronto, but the entire area. The work of the commission, it was said, was designed to bring industry into a wide district with the feeling that if this were done both Toronto and its feeder area would benefit. It would be a "grievous error" to drop the connection, said the Mayor.

He explained that it was a non-governmental agency, set up by business men and maintained by them. It had been responsible for three industries coming to the Hill, he said.

### Town Planning Highlights

Following are some of the highlights from the address on town planning given by Richmond Hill's planning director, Harold Deeks.

"... In the fashion of a mirror man's cities reflect his needs and desires spiritually, politically, socially, economically, physically and culturally. It is significant to note also that where man's cities have failed to provide for this full mixture of man's needs and desires they have failed to flourish."

"... For sound municipal and business economy downtown, for instance, must be lively — working by night because of hotels, apartments, entertainment and recreation facilities and working by day because of financial, business, shopping and cultural activities such as music, dance and art studios, libraries and book-stores — for this is the age of change in technology, in humanity and in living. Industrial and business location men are not going to expose their companies' operations to communities that will fail to attract or satisfy their employees. Nor are they going to expose their companies' investment to a community economy which rides on the opening and closing of the front door of one giant industry, even if taxes may be low."

"... Companies are not going to become involved with communities whose voters have aided or abetted the city fathers in obsession to reduce maintenance on public utilities to a minimum or below, or even not to provide them in full measure (for example additions to municipal halls, up-to-date fire equipment, modern hospital facilities, additional sewage treatment plants, storm water drainage systems, improved parks and playgrounds, etc.) in an effort to keep taxes low — for they know that some day that whopping big tax will have to be applied in order to prevent a complete collapse. To enterprising business and industrial concerns normal land costs and taxes are a small part of the cost of doing business in a progressively financed and well rounded out community."

"... Unless private investment continues on the part of citizens, financial institutions, business and industry for development, renewal and redevelopment on a sensible and prudent basis Richmond Hill will end up in financial distress and also unable to provide for the full mixture of men's needs and desires required for it to flourish."

"... Richmond Hill has been a natural centre in the historical past, it is trying today to remain as a natural centre, and in the future it should continue to be a natural centre, providing of course that advantage is taken of its strategic location, and providing that the provincial government, regardless of which party is in power, and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board recognize and support this vitality."

"... Regardless of what plan for community development Richmond Hill might adopt it can be overruled by the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board to the extent that your council will be directed by the province to pass by-law implementing the plan for the Metropolitan Toronto Planning area. Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board (has made) a Richmond Hill population prediction of 18,000 persons in 1980. Actually the population stood at 17,242 at the beginning of this year. On the face of it, it would appear that the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board plans to limit the population growth in Richmond Hill to only 758 additional persons over the next 18 years. Since Richmond Hill has over 5,900 families maybe it should be thinking in terms of a ration card system of family ordering — of course the whole thing probably should be on a selective basis. ... All things considered it is not also doubtful that the Metropolitan Planning Board could plan this community in detail? — even in broad terms of planning for Richmond Hill the Metropolitan Planning Board has shown itself limited as to accuracy."

"... In addition, the Metropolitan complex in its obsession

to become bigger and better downtown will tend to take unto itself all the industry, business and other development that it can — it will tend to feed off the municipalities like Richmond Hill which it controls and on which it can satisfy its appetite without paying for it by way of subsidies or compensation."

### Minor Car Accidents See \$325 In Damages

Two hundred and seventy-five dollars damage and a cut lip resulted from a car accident at the intersection of Markham Road and Yonge Street in Richmond Hill early Sunday morning.

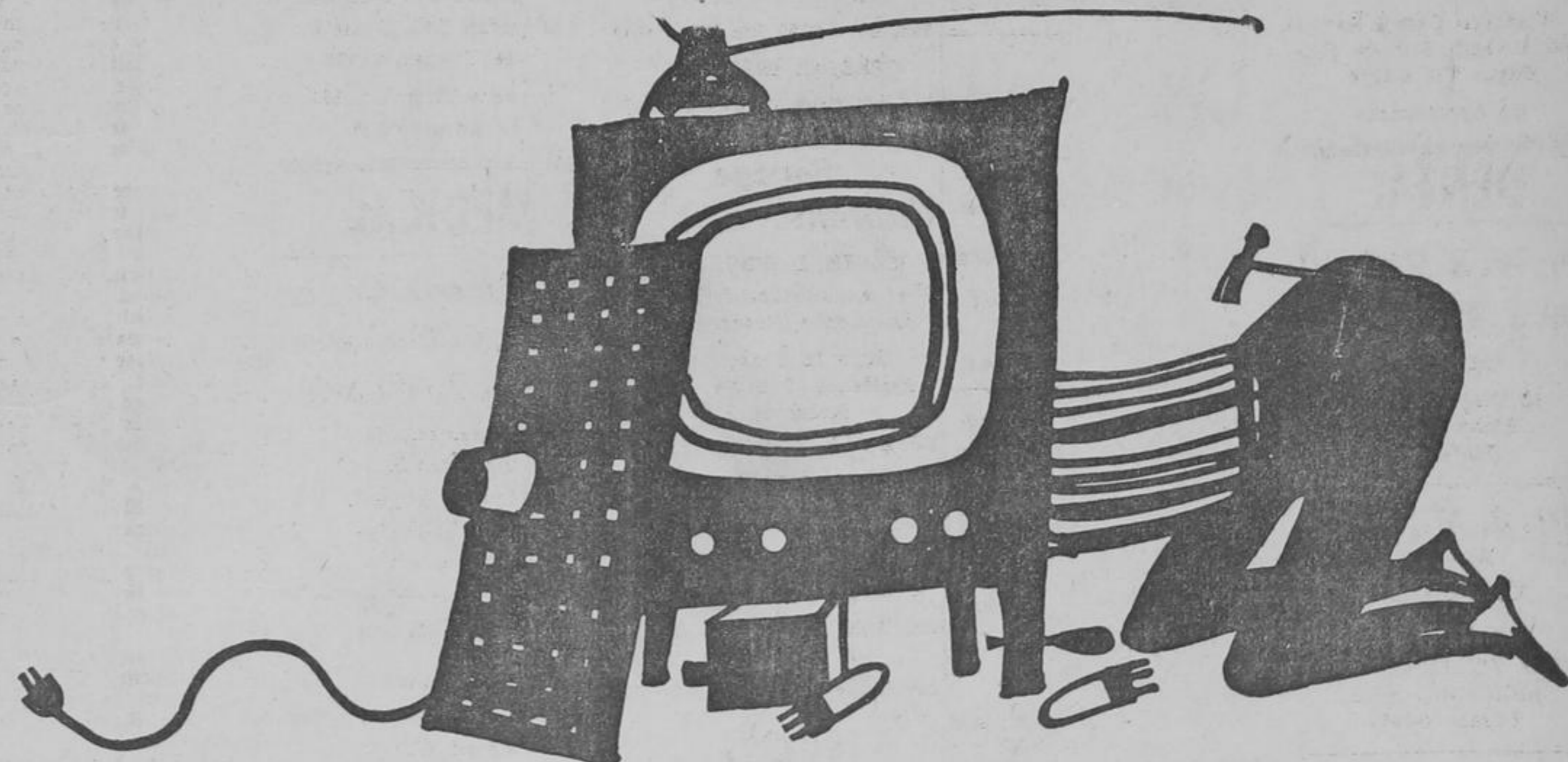
The mishap occurred when a car driven by Ross Armstrong of Richvale was in collision with another driven by Matthias Wenzl of Naughton Drive, Elgin Mills. Wenzl is said to have been turning off Yonge Street onto Markham Road when he was struck by the Armstrong car. The Wenzl vehicle sustained \$200 damage and the other \$75. Wenzl's son Albert received a cut lip.

The accident is still under investigation.

Fifty dollars damage resulted in a minor rear-end collision on Yonge Street at Crosby Avenue involving a car driven by Lloyd Castello and one driven by Victor Falas last Saturday. The Castello car \$30 damage and the other received about \$20 in damages.

### Vaughan Welfare Aid March Costs Lowered

Sixty-five fewer persons received welfare in Vaughan Township during March 1962 than during the same period last year. In March 1961 the township granted welfare assistance to 192 people in the amount of \$4,697.66. During the same month this year only 127 people required assistance, which totalled \$3,239.52. This is a saving of \$1,458.14.



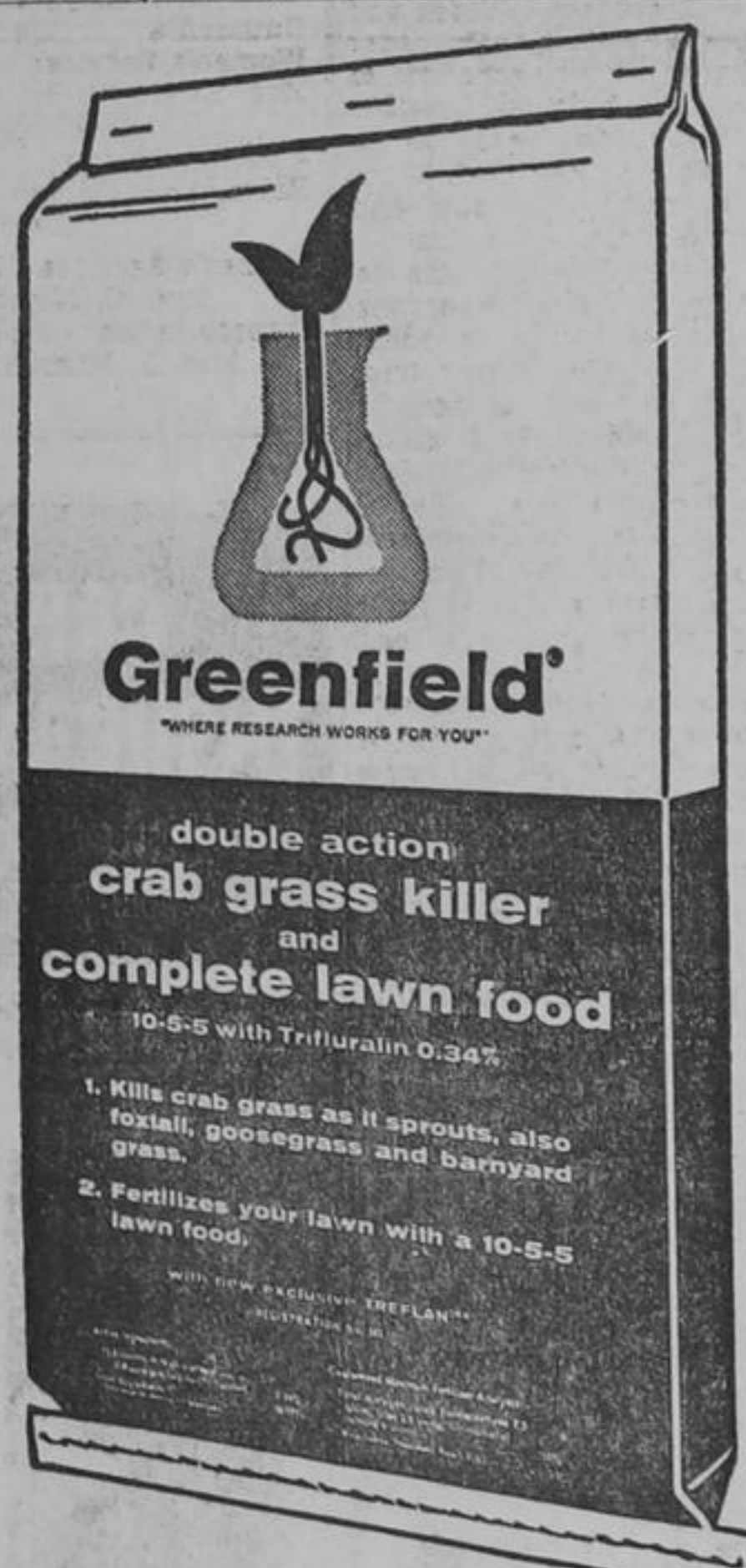
