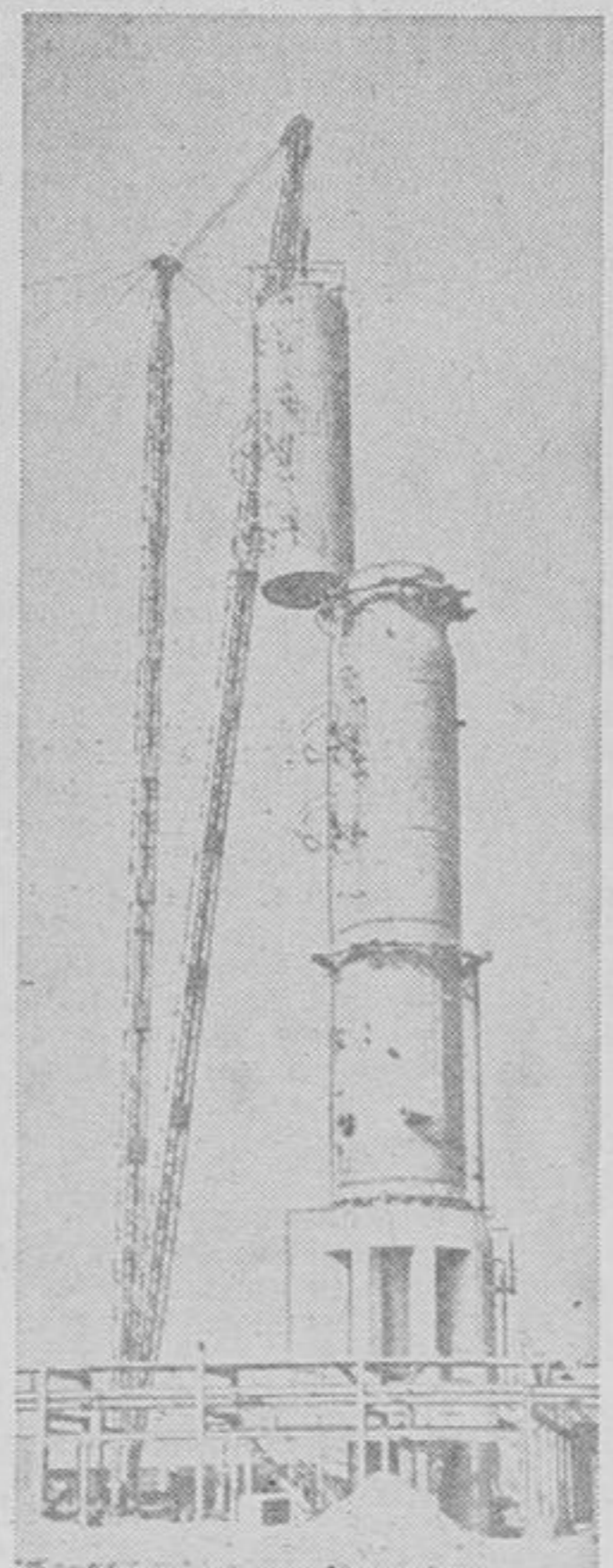

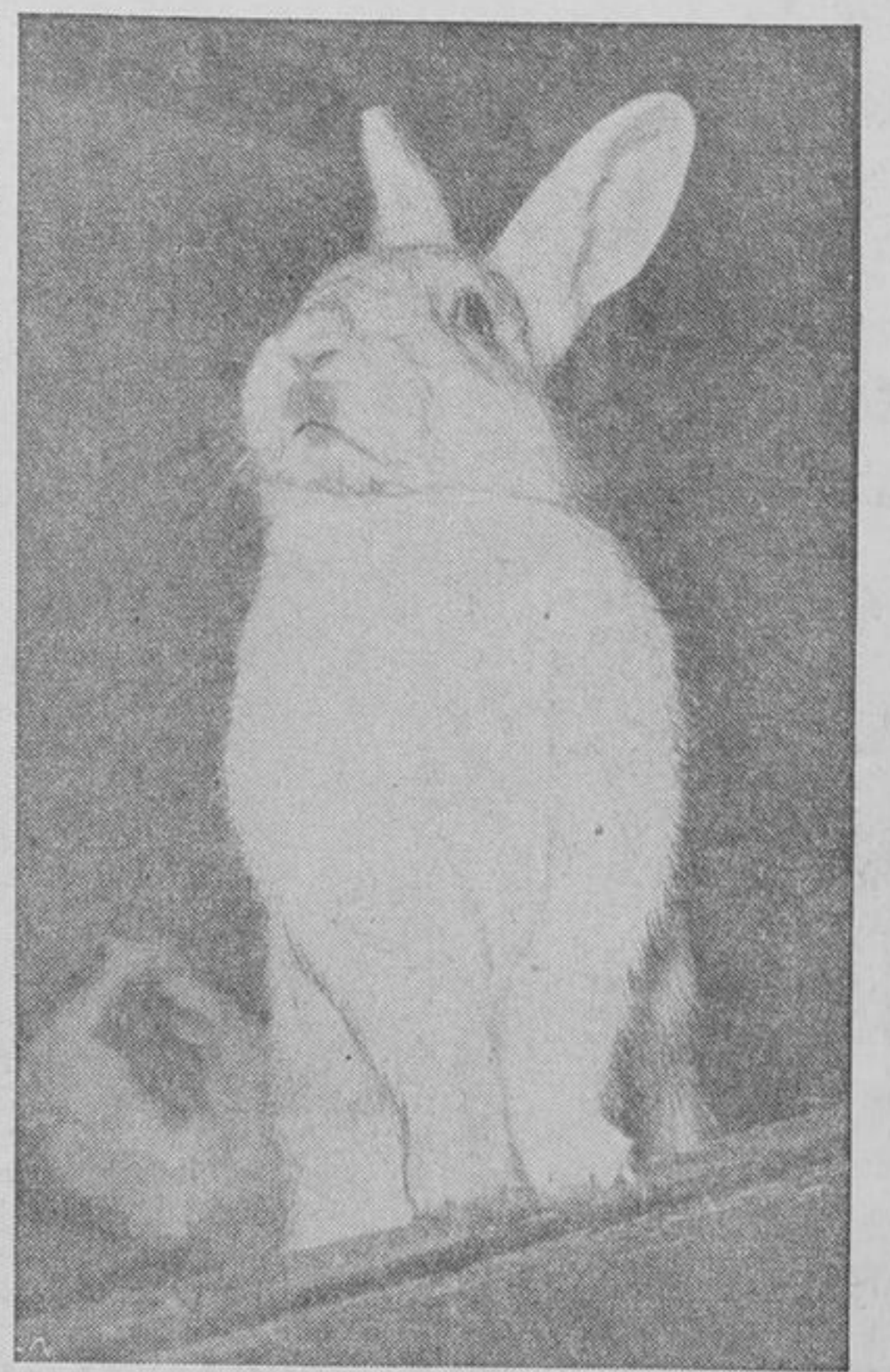
NO MISSILE—A 186-foot derrick installs the top of a tower at oil refinery in Switzerland.

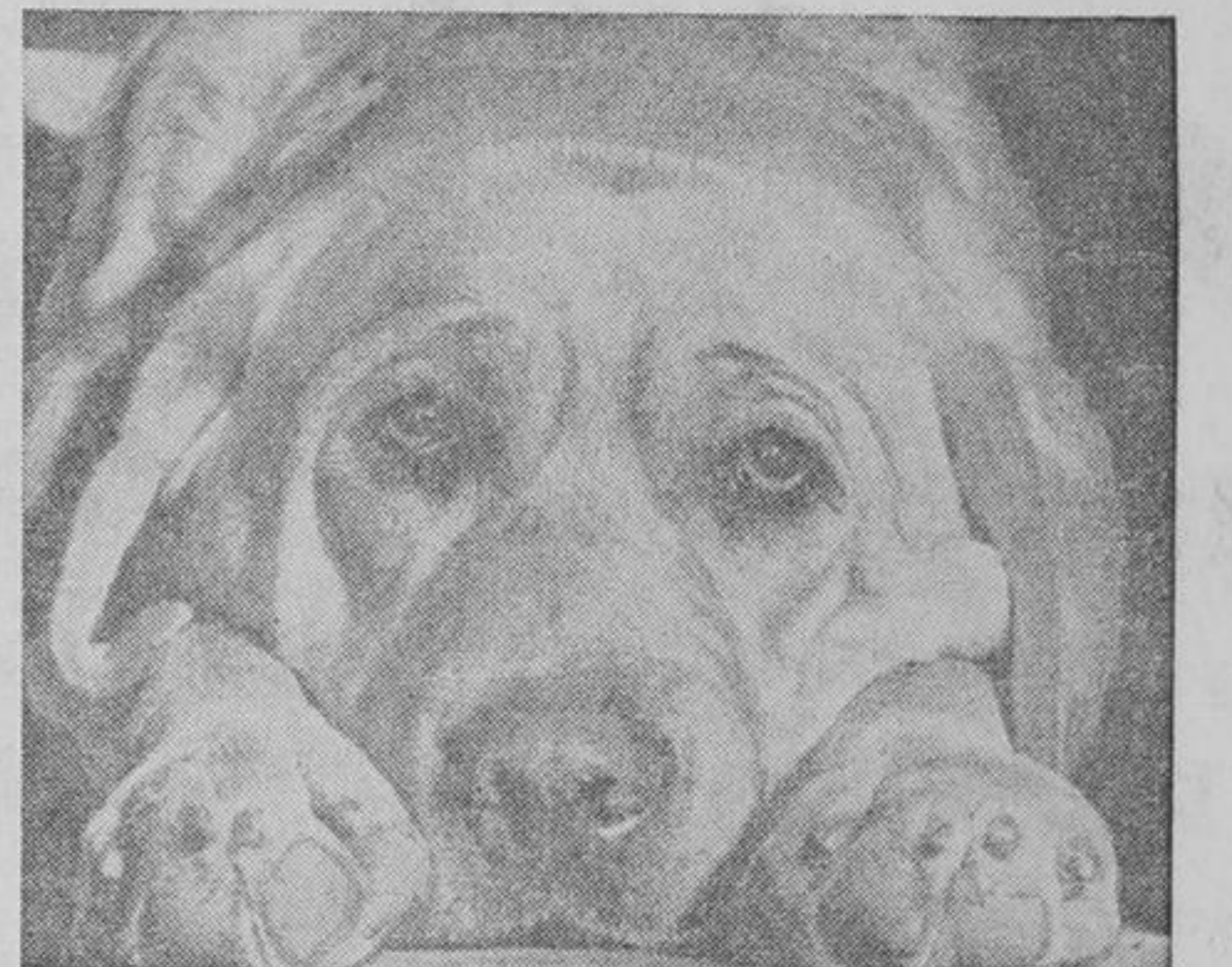
Gina Chick was "boiling mad" at Otto.



Sam C. Gull pecks away at the defense's claim that Otto didn't do it.



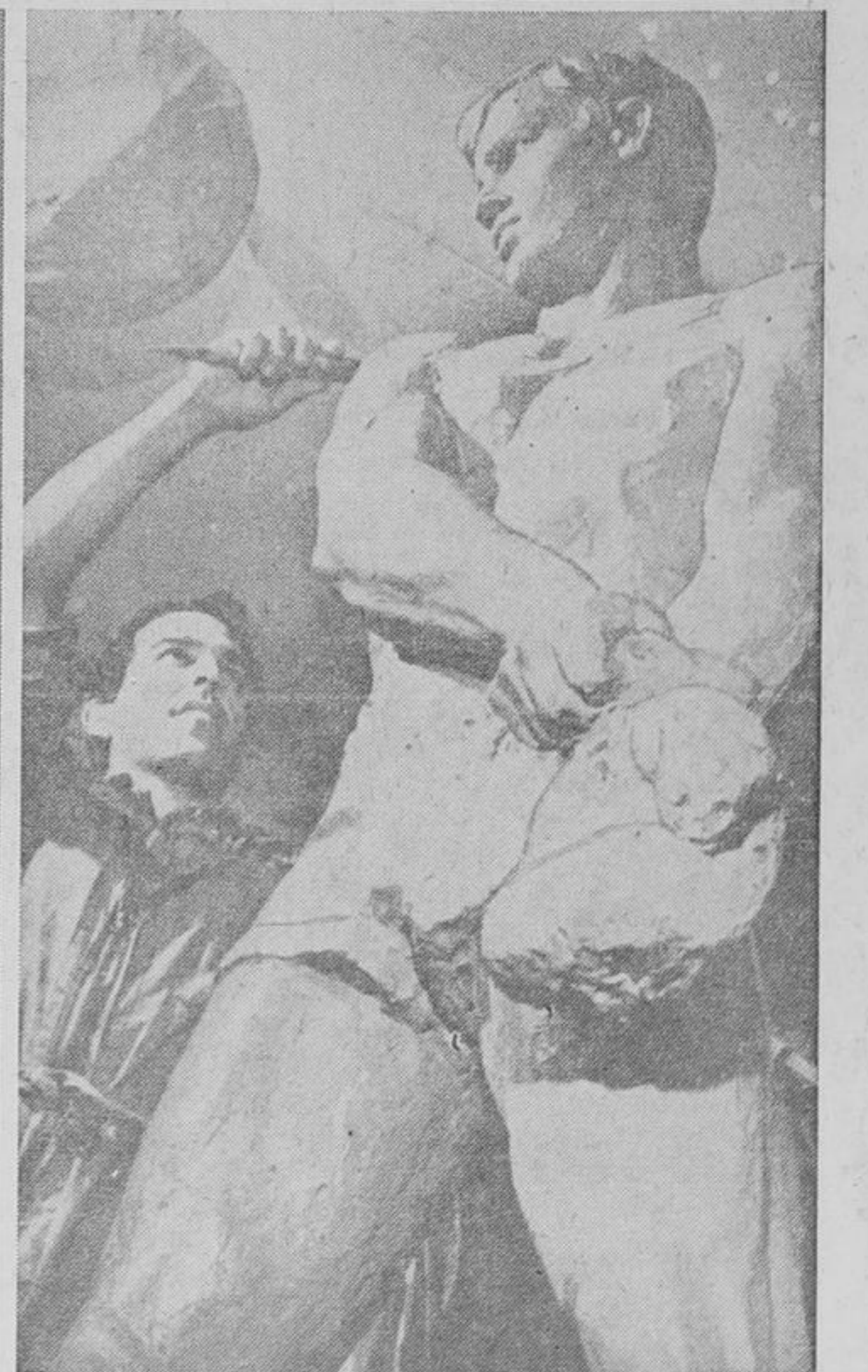
