Markham Sch. Area Asks Help Purchasing Sites

Members of the board of Markham Township School Area No. 1 appeared before Markham Township Council on Monday evening seeking some adjustment of the lot fees which they requested be shared with the board by council.

L. S. Frost, chairman, in presenting the case for the board, explained that the funds were derived from areas which when built up, required the board to move in and purchase a school site. In many cases, he said, the board had been able to move in early prior to the subdivision being developed, and in this way they saved, paying the high development price for land. However, he revealed that in the case of the Wycklife subdivision, the price of the school site was \$34,000 and the government grant was only \$910.

Talented High School Students Continental Carousel International Flavour

Last Friday night this reporter decided to venture into the Continental Cafe at Richmond Hill High School to see the Continental Carousel.

On arriving at the open doors of the cafe (gymnasium-auditorium) we were greeted by two lines of youthful garçons, serviettes draped on arms, who escorted us with professional grace to one of the gay cafe tables. In the romantic half light of the cafe a 20-foot Eiffel Tower loomed up against the wall to the left of the stage while at the right stood a 10-foot Parisian kiosk gaily plastered with colourful travel posters and topped by a brilliant red cupola. In this atmosphere one really felt transported into another world.

The program opened by a choir singing "God Save the Queen" in French, followed by French songs in which the choir ably demonstrated the initiative harmony of the sea, a windmill and the sound of bells. Mademoiselle Suzanne Higgins imparted a real Parisian flavour to the evening by her seductive rendition of La Vie En Rose. Another choir offered some of the beloved and melodic songs of Germany. John Perkins sang a romantic German love song in a mellow tenor voice. A hilarious farce was well acted in French by Grade 10 pupils. A colourful travel film of Germany was well received.

During the intermission the garçons and a corps of gaily dressed waitresses served light refreshments. The highlight of the evening was a group of Bavarian dancers from the Harmonie Club in Toronto known as the Trachten Gruppe-Alpen-chausch. They wore authentic Bavarian costumes and performed dances involving artistic verve combined with athletic agility. The program ended with a "Sing Along" with "Mitch" (John Perkins). The words of well-known French and German songs were projected on a screen so that the audience participated wholeheartedly.

Those who did not give the Carousel a whirl certainly missed a lively merry-go-round of gaiety.
