Police Not In Hardware Business But May Soon Hold Bath-tub Sale

Need a new bath-tub? You might soon be able to buy one from a rather unusual retailer — Richmond Hill's Police Department. It's a brand new one — still in its crate, as a matter of fact.

How come? The answer is comparatively simple. The tub is one of a wide variety of articles which usually through the "lost, stolen or strayed" route, comes into the possession of a police department. In this case the tub was stolen from a building site in Beverly Acres some years ago and never claimed by the owner. It, along with other odd articles, may be disposed of through an auction sale which the police department is considering holding to clear its shelves.

A bath-tub is the largest item in the police department's "department store" at the present moment but in between it and what is probably the smallest article — cuff links — there's a wide range. Umbrellas, fencing, lanterns, hub caps, clothes, toys, bicycles, add to the variety. **Valuables Are Claimed**

During the year many other items find their way into the hands of the police but many of them are reclaimed. These are the valuable ones such as rings, watches and other expensive personal property. You wouldn't think that it would be easy to lose a step-ladder, but Richmond Hill's Police Department can prove to you that, nevertheless, it is among the odd articles to come in. Almost everything from the proverbial "soup to nuts" seems to turn up in the course of time, says Police Chief R. P. Robbins.

Where do all these articles come from? All kinds of places, says the chief. Naturally, stolen goods find their way into the department but every effort is made to find the owners and in the majority of cases they are claimed. Others are picked up in ditches, back yards, gardens, vacant houses, streets, ponds, parks, fields and alleys. Many of the articles without an apparent owner have obviously been the property of children. It takes a fair-sized space in the basement of the municipal building to house the "lost and found" department. Chief Robbins said that he is considering holding an auction sale at an early date in order to make room for a new collection. No announcement has yet been made as to who will be the auctioneer. Could it be the chief himself who finally yells "Going - going - GONE?"

Anglican Young People Meet Here April 27th

The 15th Annual Youth Conference sponsored by the Toronto Diocesan Council of the Anglican Young People's Association is to be held in this area during the latter week of April. Approximately 300 young people ranging in age from 16 to 25 years will be taking part in the conference April 27th, 28th and 29th in St. Mary's and St. Gabriel Churches in Richmond Hill and All Saints Church, King.

Theme of the conference — "Your Money or Your Life" — will be explored with the help of the Rev. David Busby and Rev. David Jones of the Christian Education Division of the Anglican Church. Through the generosity of many local residents, the 300 delegates who will be in attendance will be billeted in the homes of many Anglican families in the area.

The programme of the conference begins in St. Mary's Church, Richmond Hill, at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 27th with registration and reception of delegates, to be followed by the main business session of the week-end and the introduction of the conference theme.

Saturday will begin with a solemn service of Holy Communion in St. Mary's Church, celebrated by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese after which breakfast will be provided by the ladies of the church. The remainder of the morning will then be taken up with two lengthy sessions to be based on

the theme "Your Money or Your Life". The conference will, at this point, actually become two in one, for the university and working delegates will have a service of installation and students in St. Mary's Church and pay their first visit to St. Gabriel. Following lunches at the two church halls and election of the 1962-63 diocesan council executive, delegates will enjoy three hours of free time for tours, sight-seeing and shopping. At 6:00 p.m. Saturday they will reconvene in All Saints Church, King for a huge banquet and dance at which many of the clergy and government officials will make an appearance.

Sunday will see the delegates attending morning service with their hosts at the church. Following a one o'clock luncheon at All Saints Church, there will be a service of installation and guest speaker at which time the newly elected officers are to be installed in their respective positions.

The last two conferences of the A.Y.P.A. were held in Barrie in 1960 and Peterborough in 1961. We of this area are indeed pleased to host the 1962 gathering of the A.Y.P.A. which is the official young people's organization in the Anglican Church and we take this opportunity to wish all members every success in their coming deliberations.

Fall Re-opening To See Increase In Staff, Pupils

The enrollment in Richmond Hill public schools on March 31st was 3,456, members of the public school board learned at their recent regular meeting. It is estimated that 297 pupils will leave grade 8 in June, reducing public school population to 3,159. It is likely, however, that the influx of juniors will more than compensate for the number lost and it is considered to be a safe bet that there will be well over 3,500 pupils when school starts again in September.

Present teaching staff numbers 110. Resignations and leave will see that number decreased by eight. Sixteen new teachers will be taken on, this number providing for expected expansion of pupils and to provide the necessary reserve. Five have already been employed, to start in September.

500 Members Of Auxiliary To Coming Hospital

Present membership of the York Central Hospital Auxiliary, formed only a comparatively few weeks ago, is now more than 500. At a recent meeting of the executive several new unit chairmen were introduced by Mrs. R. J. Miller, president. New branches have been formed at Buttonville, Jefferson and Richvale, with Markham and Maple organization meetings still to be held. In Richmond Hill, branches are being formed under one chairman Mrs. W. Pocknell.

A campaign to raise building funds for both York County hospitals will commence shortly. While auxiliary units will not take part in this drive, individual members may offer their services.

"Great enthusiasm is being shown by youth groups," said Mrs. F. Jackson, "and work must be found for them to do." A gift shop committee will soon be formed, as there is much preliminary work to be done before the hospital is completed. Mrs. Ernest Redmeier requested names, addresses and preferences for work of all branch auxiliary members.

The auxiliary has taken membership in the Ontario Women's Hospital Auxiliary Association. The next meeting of the board will be held in the Richmond Hill Public Library on May 17th at 10 a.m.
