"Schools — education — hydro — high water rates — leaking sewers — were among the topics discussed at the monthly meeting of the Grandview Estates Ratepayers Association on April 9th at Henderson Avenue School, with some sixty people attending.

President Dr. C. E. Phillips, in opening the meeting, reported on his visit to Markham Township office and his interview with Township Clerk, Mr. Harry Crisp, relative to the high cost of water in the Grandview Estates area, also the excessive cost and quantity of water going into the sewers, evidently caused by leakage. After examination of this situation, an official report is expected in ten days, when talks will be resumed with Markham Township officials.

At this point, Mr. Stevens stood up and said that after his two or three visits to the township office, he believed that it was advisable for the ratepayers not to be too optimistic until changes were made in the council.

"Is the water alright to drink now — as we have received notices stating to boil all water for drinking?" was asked by Mr. Phillips. The reply was that "though there was a great change in the colour of the water — it was safe to drink", the discoloration being caused by entry of foreign matter when the water main was lowered. Some residents who live on Woodward and Highland Park Avenues stated that they had not received any notification of water difficulty.

President Phillips advised the residents that dogs should be kept on their own property, also that supervision be exercised regarding children on the lawns of other people. In case of fire, anyone should call AV. 5-5433.

Supervising Principal, C. J. Sand, of this area was next introduced as the speaker for the evening and spoke of the history of the first schools and how they gradually built up this area. The school area board was elected in 1960 — a five member board, elected on rotation basis.

Some of the committees were under the heading of health recreation, public relations, finance and education. In addition to Woodland School, the board is endeavouring to acquire more property. Eventually, there will be a twelve room school. Regarding Henderson Avenue School, a limit as to size has been reached, and eventually another school with 14 classrooms will be required, which will be a senior school, and Henderson Avenue a junior school.

"We have a good group of teachers" said Principal Sand, "physical education supervision, and now introduction of French for pupils in grades 6, 7 and 8. We have one special class — called the auxiliary class — a selected group of children from 7 and 8 grade pupils that meet one afternoon a week. We are making our children conscious of the value of education. . . . Some of the lectures are on law, theology, sales and engineering, with doctors and nurses to speak too.

What does the world expect of boys and girls in education?" is their main theme", concluded the speaker. After answering a number of questions from the audience, Principal Sand received a great ovation from the members. President Phillips thanked the speaker, and, in closing the meeting, informed those present that there are now 92 family members of the Grandview Estates Ratepayers Association and that the next meeting was scheduled for May 14th.
