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**BREWERS' WAREHOUSING**  
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**Rescue Service For County EMO In New Quarters**

York County Emergency Measures Organization is extending its training in rescue work to a training primarily designed for use in the event of a nuclear attack by an enemy but, at the same time, work which might be of use in peace-time emergencies.

Twelve thousand square feet of space in a service station at the corner of Sharon Road and Davis Drive, Newmarket, is being rented and a rescue school will be held there, says Major W. F. A. Preston, Emergency Measures Co-ordinator for York County. The rescue truck and equipment which is at present being kept at EMO headquarters near York County office in Newmarket will be kept at the new location.

The remainder of the course at present in operation will be held there. Nearly 90 men are now enrolled in the rescue service, one third of them completely trained and the remainder either partially trained or awaiting training.

The number trained represents one platoon. When training of the remainder is completed there will be the equivalent of a full company. Once a company is organized training will start on another. Members of the rescue service come from Keswick, Richmond Hill, Newmarket, Aurora and other York County communities.

**Vaughan May Tighten Insurance Of Permits For Moving Houses**

Vaughan Township is going to make sure that it doesn't run into any more trouble with house movers.

Council has decided to have the present method of issuing house moving permits reviewed by township employees to see if it would be advisable to have all permits processed through the municipal offices in Maple.

At present the application is reviewed by one man and the permit subsequently issued. However, under the proposed system the application would be reviewed by a member of the police department, a road department employee and an employee of the building department. The police department would arrange to have an escort for the house while it is in transit, the cost of the escort to be met by the mover. The building department employee will ensure, if the house was

destined for a site in the township, that the necessary building permits had been taken out and the road department would check conditions of the roads to be taken and also would make sure that all other moving permits from other municipalities and commissions had been procured.

The whole problem in a recent case was that the mover had not been able to get a Toronto and York Roads Commission permit to move his house on Maple Road. Nevertheless the Vaughan Township permit was issued and when the mover could not proceed onto Maple Road he had nowhere to go, so had to leave his equipment in the township. Unfortunately, he insisted on leaving the house on a street instead of in a field where he had been instructed to leave it.
