### Petition Must Be Taken First

### Whitchurch Council Turns Down Request For Liquor Vote Date

Whitchurch Township Council recently turned down a request from three township businessmen to set a date for a liquor plebiscite. Instead, council passed a resolution requiring that a 25% affirmative petition be taken before council would consider setting a date.

The three, Grant McCachen of the Ridges Inn in Oak Ridges, Keith Nesbitt, mayor of Aurora, and owner of West View Golf and Country Club in the township and Stewart Patrick, former Aurora Council member and operator of Glendale Beach at Musselman Lake, asked the council to set a date for the holding of a vote to establish dining room and lounge liquor sales.

Councillor Ross Farquharson favoured the setting of a date, however the remainder of council felt a petition should be taken to determine whether enough people in the township were in favour of holding a plebiscite. This is in line with a resolution passed by last year's council and provincial legislation requiring a petition to be taken under similar circumstances then. Although a date for a liquor vote was set by council last year the vote fell through when the "Vote Yes" committee objected to the way in which the by-laws were set out. After the by-law setting the dates was rescinded by council, a resolution was passed requiring a 25% affirmative petition taken before any further action could be taken on the liquor question. No further action was taken. Provincial legislation requires that a 25% petition of the eligible voters can be sought before a vote is authorized.

### Approve Pay For Trustees

### King City Bd. Of Trade Seeks Improved Parking

A delegation from King City's new board of trade, headed by Mr. Leroy Smyth, asked for improved parking conditions to help the dwindling number of business establishments, at village trustees' April 23 meeting in the fire hall.

Mr. Smyth suggested trustees could "help improve commercial business in town" by widening the entrance to Doctors Lane, giving it a better grade and more gravel.

He felt culverts were needed along King Street, but said the businessmen were prepared to wait for results of the railroad survey. "We feel the parking is inadequate between Doctors Lane and the Post Office".

Trustee James Sim reminded that gravel would be put on most of the roads this year.

Board of trade members Robert Walker and Robert McLeod joined in the discussion about downtown parking, which resulted in a motion by Roads Commissioner Robert Berwick.

It was agreed trustees would write Toronto and York Roads Commission about correcting the grade at Doctors Lane and the possibility of installing a storm sewer on King Street.

Chairman Robert O'Reilly welcomed the delegation. "We're happy you've formed this organization for the betterment of King City and we appreciate you bringing a deputation of businessmen here," he said.

Trustee Berwick added, "I can assure you the squeaking wheel gets the grease".

Trustees made arrangements for the cleaning and re-tubing of the fluorescent street lights around September 1 at an estimated cost of \$150.

Trustees passed enabling by-laws, which were read by Secretary-Manager, G. T. Thompson. Two authorized trustees to sign agreements regarding purchase of electrical power and the distribution system.

A by-law to be forwarded to the Department of Municipal Affairs for approval was enacted, seeking a yearly salary of \$125 for each trustee.

Trustees considered the southeast corner of the Heritage Park roads superintendent and Trustee Berwick would determine how much work was necessary at what cost. In the roads budget \$1,000 is allowed for the project this year.

**Hydro Purchase**  
Notification was received the Ontario Municipal Board had given final approval to the twenty-year purchase of King City distribution system at a cost of \$115,000.

A ratepayer's letter complained of bank erosion and faulty ditch drainage on McBride Avenue. The problem was left to Trustee Berwick and the secretary to manage to inspect in the assumed second plan of Clearview Gardens.

Trustee Berwick reported Toronto and York Roads had completed the sidewalk survey on Springhill Road and Mr. Thompson was to meet township and Department of Highways engineers about approvals.

"The sidewalk as far as John Street along Springhill Road is going to be very expensive, but is very necessary", said Trustee Berwick.

To keep the intersection area tidy, trustees decided to continue paying an approximate 1 1/2 hours weekly salary to Mr. Art Brown to collect litter before garbage pick-up.

Trustees agreed to obtain the free advice of General Electric regarding street lighting and the secretary was asked to supply a plan of the village.

Test drilling for a suitable location for the third well was expected to start immediately on the Austin Rumble farm.

The chairman read a confirmation from J. W. Kirk regarding the agreement finalized April 9 between trustees and International Water Supply Limited.

"The test drilling shall be done at our regular rates as outlined in the agreement. The cost of the testing shall not exceed \$3,000," the letter read.

"If the testing locates a suitable aquifer which will produce the minimum of 200 imperial gallons a minute, the construction of the permanent well shall not be commenced until the Trustees of King City, the Ontario Water Resources Commission and the Ontario Municipal Board have given approval to proceed," wrote Mr. Kirk.

**Only 3 Fires In Village**  
Trustee Sim reported police duties "fairly quiet", with the officer continuing part-time duty with the township. Commenting on "the tremendous number of fires this month", Mr. Sim noted they had been mostly outside the village. Three were inside.

Just as ratepayer James Wilkins was concerned about all the grass fires and was pointing out to trustees, "Uncut grass on unfarmed properties is a potential fire source", the first of two alarms during the meeting sounded.

Fire Chief David Glass and volunteers Robert Walker and John Monkman, who were among ten ratepayers present, hurriedly departed to control a grass fire south of Clearview Gardens on the Stewart farm. Half an hour later they were called to another blaze on the Harrison farm on the fourth concession.

The chairman started to call a recess so that Trustees Sim and Berwick could carry out their duties as firemen, but it was decided they were not needed.

Next meeting was scheduled for May 14 at eight p.m. in the fire hall.

### Home and School

The final meeting of the season for the Oak Ridges Home and School Association will be held in the school auditorium, May 7th.

A social evening has been planned and business is to be kept to the minimum.

A film will be shown by the Department of Lands and Forests and the musical portion of the evening will be handled by Mrs. Bostlund and Dr. J. N. Emerson, who, with his guitar, has been invited back.

York County Health Unit holds a well baby clinic once a month in the Lake Wilcox - Oak Ridges area. On the second Tuesday of each month, a team of registered nurses and a doctor set up clinic at St. Paul's United Church. The next clinic will be held May 10th, at 1:30 p.m.
