**150 Years Service With Sheppard And Gill**

Service is the motto at Sheppard and Gill Lumber Company, 71 Centre St. E. — service not only to the public, but service to the company by its employees. A total of 150 years service is represented in the accompanying picture of the staff of this firm which has been in business in the Hill since March, 1930.

At that time, Frank Schissler came from the company's head office in Toronto to take over the management of the yard at 71 Centre St. E., which had been purchased from the Jones Lumber Company. Mr. Schissler managed the yard for 29 years, retiring at the end of 1959, after a total of 32 years service with the firm.

Present manager is Mr. Walter DeGeer, a native of Toronto who has had 26 years service with the firm. He originally joined the company as a salesman on the head office staff in Toronto. In 1944 he was appointed manager of the Bowmanville branch, where he remained until the beginning of this year. Mr. DeGeer not only has a fine record of service with the Sheppard and Gill Lumber Company, but an equally good

record of public service. While in Bowmanville he served as president of the Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the town council for five years. He is also a past president of the Rotary Club there and past District Governor of Rotary in southern Ontario. Mr. DeGeer is presently living at 50 Benson Avenue and will certainly make a useful contribution to life on the Hill.

Mr. DeGeer's right hand man at the yard turns out to be something of a surprise to the customers. "He" is Miss Violet McFeeters, herself a veteran of 18 years service with the company. When he first went to Bowmanville, Mr. DeGeer expressed the wish to one of the local inhabitants for a good smart girl in his office. Miss McFeeters was pointed out to him as "the smartest girl in town" and Mr. DeGeer promptly prevailed on her to join his staff.

Since then she has played an ever increasing role in the business. Last year she graduated from a course at the Lumber Dealers' Training Institute, conducted by the Ontario Retail Lumber Dealers' Association

The only woman in the course, with an average of 97%. So if there is anything you want to know about lumber when you drop in at 71 Centre St. E., just ask Vi — she can tell you anything you want to know.

Miss McFeeters has also been active in community activities and served for two years as president of the Business and Professional Women's Association of Bowmanville. For three years she was chairman of the Provincial Emblems Committee of this organization and also served on the survey and research committee for the provincial body. Miss McFeeters is now staying with Mrs. Robinson on Church St.

The other members of the staff also have enviable records of service: Huck Young, in charge of house sales and service, 20 years; Steve Young, yard foreman, 27 years; Lorne Sheardown, shipper-driver, 14 years and Bill Sheardown, shipper-driver, 13 years.

And while this fine organization has served Richmond Hill so well during the past years of fabulous expansion in the area, they are now equipped to serve the community even better
