**Lutheran Pastor Rev. A. E. Myers To Be Officially Installed Sunday**

Albert E. Myers, B.A., B.D., S.T.M., will be officially installed as pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church Sunday at 11 a.m.

The service of installation will be conducted in the Walter Scott School, Markham Road, by the Rev. Norman Berner, Pastor Berner is assistant to the president of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Canada.

Pastor Myers moved to Richmond Hill last October to bring the Lutheran mission to official organization. He has served previously in Flin Flon, Manitoba, Jeromesville, Ohio, and Cheyenne, Wyoming.

The Lutheran clergyman is a graduate of Western Reserve Academy, Hudson, Ohio. He was ordained in 1955. He and his wife and three children reside at 110 Rockport Crescent.

Pastor Berner will also take part in the regular monthly meeting of the Church Council Sunday at 7 p.m. Under discussion will be building plans. The congregation meets for worship at 11 a.m. each Sunday in the Walter Scott School pending construction on its building site adjacent to Bayview High School.

A capital funding visitation was held last Sunday. The results are encouraging the congregation to plan for ground-breaking next spring.

The congregation is one of over 1,100 Lutheran Churches in the Dominion. It is affiliated with the Canadian Lutheran Council and the Lutheran World Federation. Through Pastor Myers it participates in the work of the local ministerial association.

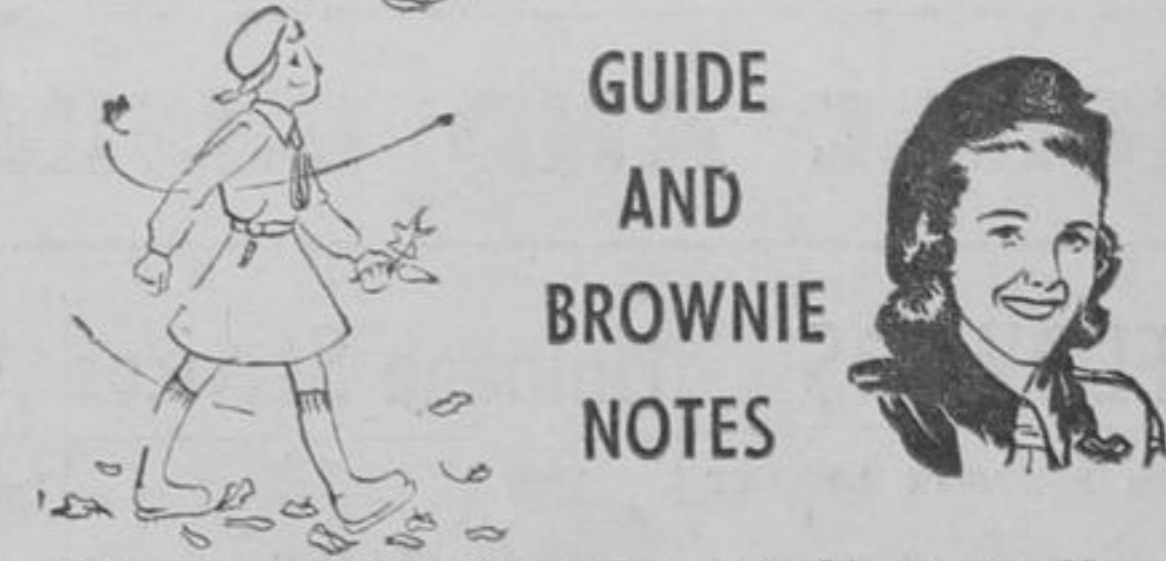
edless to say, this booth did a roaring business, and Mr. Bull who was in charge, was just about as hot and bothered as were the hot dogs he was selling!
