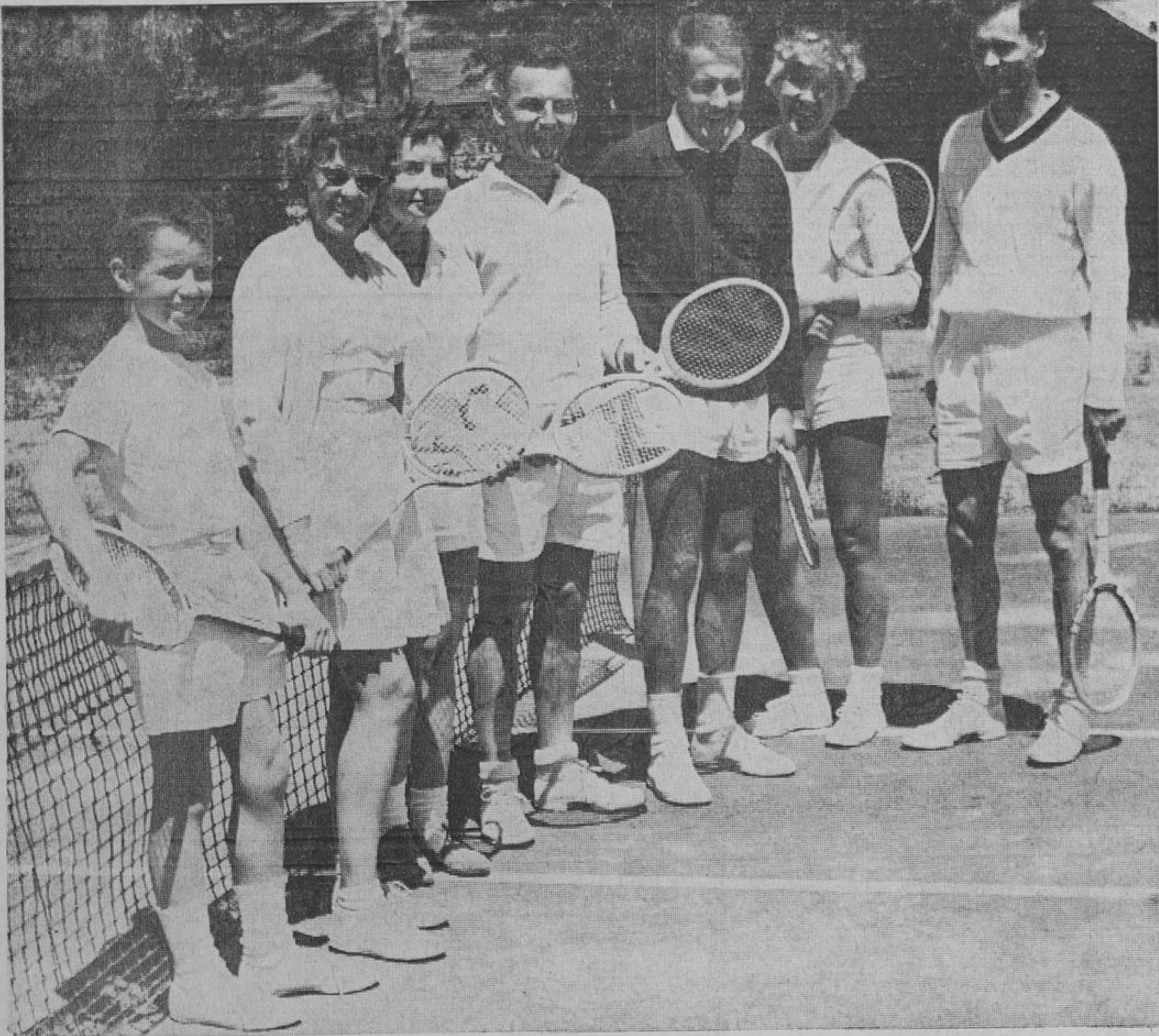


Local Tennis Season Gets Officially Underway

Something that we've suspected for a long time was proven for us last week. We often wondered if a bunch of veterans in any given sport could stand off the challenge of eager, willing youth. And they can, at least in softball.

Kent Clothes have put together a young and willing group of softball players. As a junior team they are operating in an intermediate league. The jump from junior to intermediate class softball might not seem like much if you're not a softball fiend. If you are hooked on softball you'll realize that it's the difference between night and day.

Juniors are 20 years old and under. There is no age in intermediate ball. And that big age spread tells on behalf of the intermediate players.

The juniors are full of vim and vigour — always raring to go. In fact they're so keyed up that miscues often result. On the other hand the older players are relaxed, more poised and certainly more confident and sure of themselves. This poise and confidence is not something that can be bought in a large economy package. It's the end result of several years of seasoning in good softball competition.

Kent Clothes, as a junior team, can only benefit by placing in a league with more seasoned players. Pitching has just that much more jump and pitchers have an extra measure of control. Where a junior pitcher will be tempted to groove the ball when he's behind the batter the intermediate hurler will continue to shoot for the corners. He has learned, (Continued on page 10)

Umpires Needed At King

Anyone who is not too sensitive by nature, and who likes the idea of being a baseball umpire, will find a ready welcome in the flourishing local leagues operated by the King City Lions Club.

Chairman of the Lions' baseball committee John Langdon told "The Liberal" the three leagues now playing Tuesday and Friday evenings are well supplied with coaches and assistants, but the need for umpires is "dire". He can place several, back of the catcher and on the bases.

A total of 160 boys registered in the pee-wee league for 7 and 8-year-olds; in the intermediates, 10, 11 and 12-year-olds; and in the senior league for boys 13 to 15.

Three teams are competing in the pee-wee section. At the end of May the Chiefs, coached by James Wemyss, were in the lead with four points; the Jets, coached by Ray Love, were second with two points; and the Leafs, coached by Garnet Dawson and William Curran trailed with a goose egg.

Intermediates have the biggest league with six teams. The Braves, coached by Bob Berwick and Vern Nauftts, are first with five points; Giants coached by Clifford Couits and Donald Laing are tied with the Reds, coached by Peter Robertson and Harold Gilbert, with four points.

Cardinals, trained by George "Nip" Armstrong and Jack Garbutt, have three points. Dodge

ers under Stan Roots and Gage Love have chalked up two points, the same as the Pirates, coached by George Bennet and Bob Shankland.

In the senior league, the Yankees, led by Robert Walker and Alex Campbell, are tied at four points with the White Sox, coached by John Loughran and Allen Cooke.

Two points each were scored by the Indians under William Cook and John Jenkins, and the Senators, led by Ross Farquhar and Ed Poulin.

Several parents have been turning out to cheer the boys at the four diamonds in use, at Doris L. Patton School, Eva L. Dennis School, and two at King Memorial Park.

Registration is slightly down from last year, by about 10 players. The schedule continues until June 26 for the seniors. The younger boys will be starting play-off games a week earlier.
