

New car buyers deciding on what options they need or can do without usually never give a thought to one of the least expensive but most useful aids to driving they could have on their

This is known as Positive Traction Differential. It is a special rear axle gear assembly that prevents spinning one wheel on ice or when it is clear of the road. It is so effective that it largely eliminates M. R. Bear the need for snow tires, which

expensive. Standard differential gearing transmits power from a single drive shaft to both rear wheels. In itself it is a complicated mechanism because it must have a variable capacity to turn one wheel faster than the other when the need arises, such as in rounding a curve. The outside wheel in a turn is moving faster and the differential equalizes the power drive to both

in actual fact are usually more

This necessary quality becomes a handicap on ice and rough roads however. With one wheel on ice and the other on dry pavement, for instance, all power is shifted to the wheel with least grip, causing it to

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

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
