## Snatch War Hero's Body From King City Grave

Vandorf OPP disclosed last week that ghouls tore the body of a World War II war hero from its grave in King City Cemetery during the night of June 12-13.

The torso of a man, decorated with the Distinguished Service Order by Viscount Alexander, was found on top of the grave by cemetery caretaker Earl Campbell when he arrived at work on the morning of June 13.

Police believe the desecration was the work of youths who used their own digging tools as none of the cemetery's equipment was touched. Casts of footprints found at the scene were made by the OPP.

Located at the north end of the cemetery, the grave is not visible from the two entrances several hundred yards south at the King Sideroad.

Corp. Robert Pettigrew and Const. John Cross of the OPP Vandorf detachment are still investigating the incident. No suspects have been taken into custody.

While similar incidents have been cropping up elsewhere in the province, Vandorf OPP reported this was the first distur-  
bance of its kind in this area.

**Service Vote Goes Liberal**

With the addition of the service vote, Liberal John Addison's majority in the recent Federal election has been increased to 964 votes, according to York North Returning Officer Warren Baille.

Count shows Addison received 209 votes, C. A. (Tina) Cathers (PC) 87, Stanley Hall (NDP) 10 and Alex Ford (Social Credit) 6 votes.

**Citation Award Fatal Free Year**

For the third time, Richmond Hill has won a special Citation Award for having completed 1961 without a fatal traffic accident. It shares the distinction with 28 other Canadian communities with populations of over 5,000.

Presentation of the award came at the eleventh annual Public Safety Awards luncheon in Toronto, sponsored by the Ontario Safety League. The Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association also received an award for "exceptional services to safety in 1961."

A fatality on April 22 of this year was the first traffic death in Richmond Hill since Jan. 12, 1960. It ended 830 accident free days.

Mayor James Haggart and Police Chief R. P. Robbins accepted the award on behalf of Richmond Hill.

"I am proud of the people of Richmond Hill. It is their award," the mayor said. "They have won it by safe driving and by teaching their children good safety habits. I was honored to accept it on their behalf."

**Commerce New Billing Method**

Hydro customers in rural areas of Ontario will take over control of their service entrance equipment Jan. 1, 1963, according to a recent customer letter sent out by Ontario Hydro.

Up until now, such equipment has been owned and serviced by the hydro. Until Jan. 1, it will continue to repair or replace the equipment at no charge.

In 1963, Ontario Hydro will charge for the cost of materials along with a nominal \$2 service charge.

The new rules is little more than a change in the method of billing. Until four years ago, the customer's hydro rates were based on the size of the service entrance equipment.

Thus, the change is only an attempt by Hydro to bill the customer more fairly, officials state.
