A seasonal report on 17 public swimming pools in York County was given recently to the Board of Health by Medical Officer Dr. R. M. King. Approval of the board was indicated for most of the pools, hile seven received inade-

quate recommendation. Dr. King indicated that the apread of bacterial and virus diseases remains a risk in use of swimming pools. Full cooperation by pool operators to prevent disease spread is essential at all times he said. Use of disinfecting compounds including water chlorination is required by the board where the pool is open to the public.

Privately used home-located . . awimming pools are not subject to health unit inspection, and do not come within the jurisdiction of provincial regulations on swimming pools, Dr King said.
