**Board Approves 10 Of 17 Pools**

A seasonal report on 17 public swimming pools in York County was given recently to the Board of Health by Medical Officer Dr. R. M. King.

Approval of the board was indicated for most of the pools, while seven received inadequate recommendation. Dr. King indicated that the spread of bacterial and virus diseases remains a risk in use of swimming pools. Full cooperation by pool operators to prevent disease spread is essential at all times he said. Use of disinfecting compounds including water chlorination is required by the board where the pool is open to the public. Privately used home-located swimming pools are not subject to health unit inspection, and do not come within the jurisdiction of provincial regulations on swimming pools, Dr. King said.

There will be no open season this year in York County on white-tailed deer, county council decided at its June session.

Ontario Lands and Forests Minister J. W. Spooner had written to the county, asking if an open season, November 5, 6 and 7 would be acceptable to the county.

Mr. Spooner's letter pointed out that the white-tailed deer had rebounded from near-extinction in Southern Ontario, to the point where the Department of Lands and Forests is being asked to pay for crops damaged by deer.

Several councillors pointed out that the hunters might cause more damage than the deer, if the huge Metro Toronto population were allowed to hunt in York County.

The county will advise Mr. Spooner that it feels no open season for deer is necessary in York County.

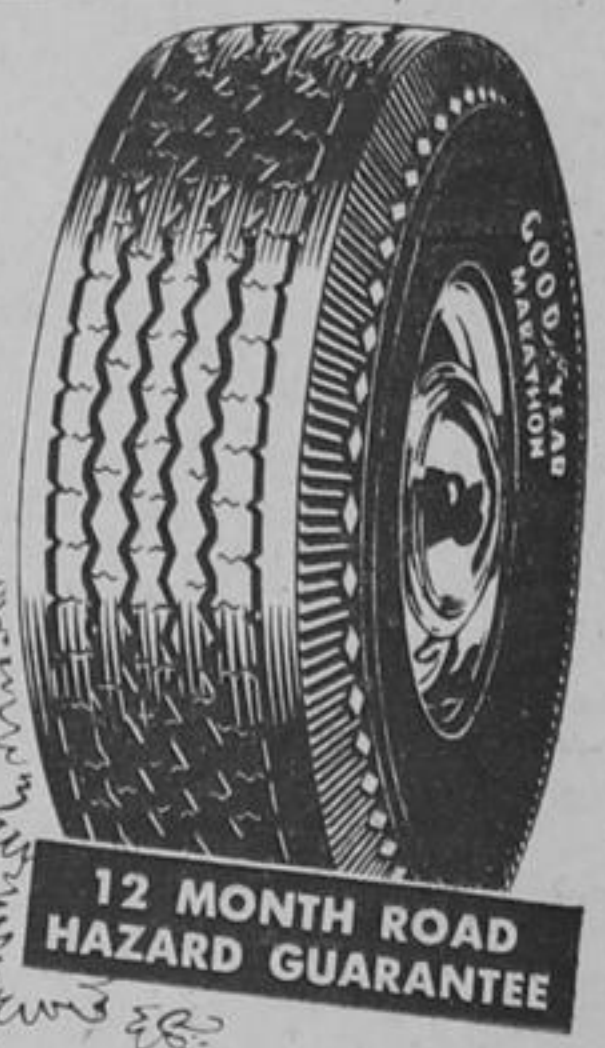
**Will Distribute \$15,000 Birds In Six Townships**

According to J. S. Dorland, of the fish and wildlife branch, there is reason to believe that pheasant hunters will again enjoy fair to good hunting in regulated townships next fall, in the Lake Simcoe District. In addition to a fair natural hatch of pheasants this past spring, Department of Lands and Forests is planning to release some 15,000 birds in 15 regulated townships. Of this number, some 8,900 will be leg banded and released in the Townships of Toronto, Chinguacousy, King, Whit-church, Markham and Pickering. This will be the second year that all pheasants released in these townships have been leg banded. Mr. Dorland stated that hunters should provide some interesting data on the extent of natural hatching. As in previous years hunters are again requested to supply the department with pheasant hunting statistics which is a very important contribution in developing proper management programs and promoting good hunting.

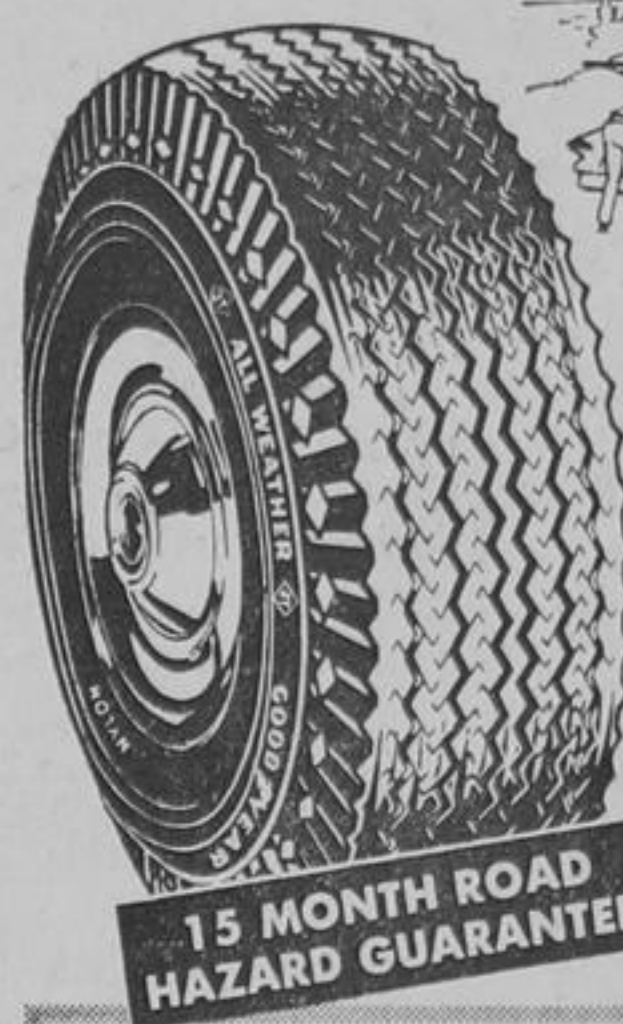
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
