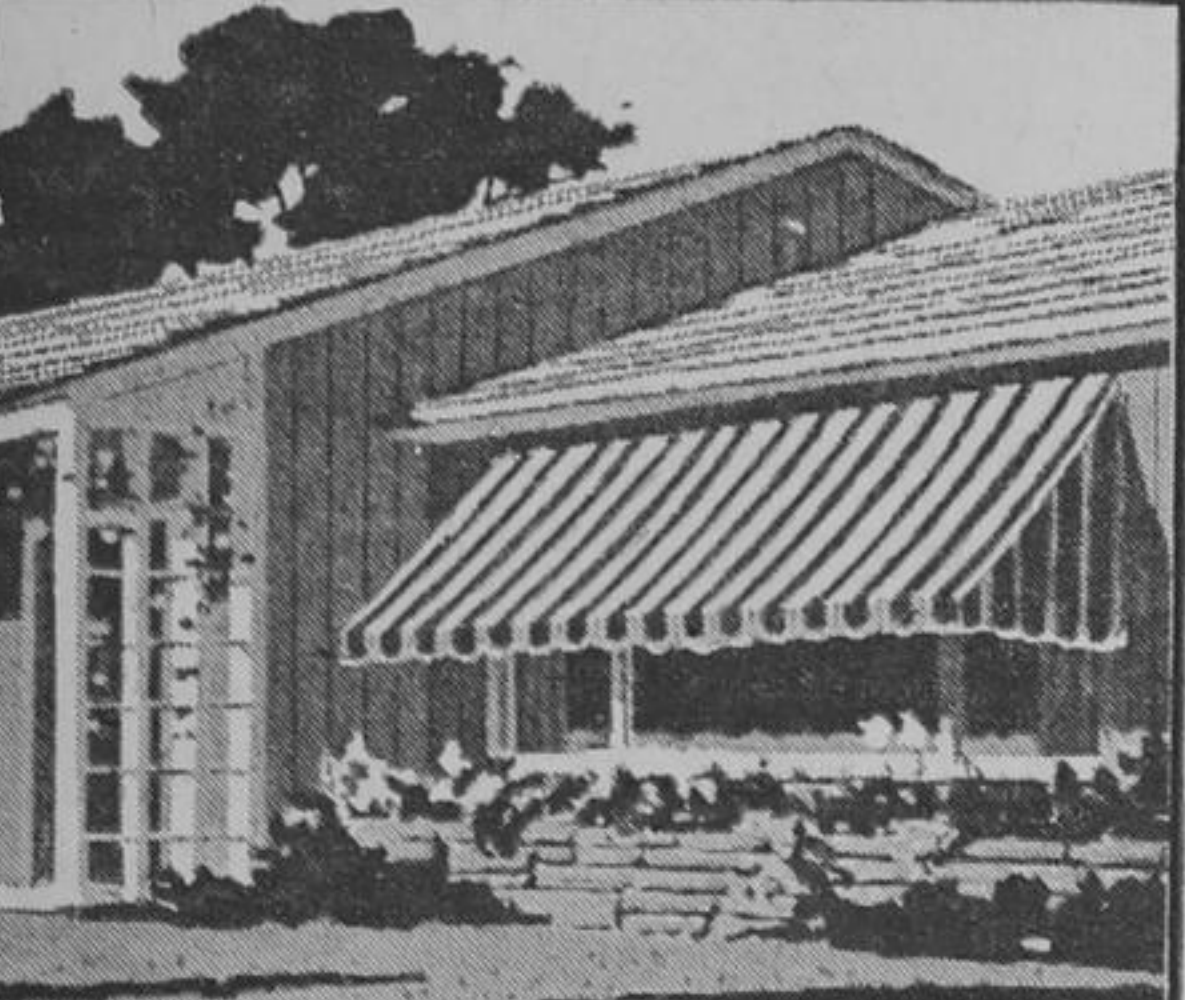

School Cleared In Bomb Threat

Threat of an unexploded bomb cleared King City Composite School Tuesday morning last week, while a thorough search of the building on King Sideroad was made by Ontario Provincial Police from Vandorf detachment.

Aurora and District High School Board declined to reveal how the threat was made. The board was aware of the rumor the previous day and were able to keep classrooms empty Tuesday morning.

Instead of writing their science examinations at the King City School, 150 Grade 9 students were transferred to Aurora High School for the morning. They returned to the village school at noon.

Normal operation of the school was resumed in the afternoon. Four hundred students in the regular enrollment were not attending classes because they were not writing exams.

This was the first incident of its kind since the modern split-level school opened last September.

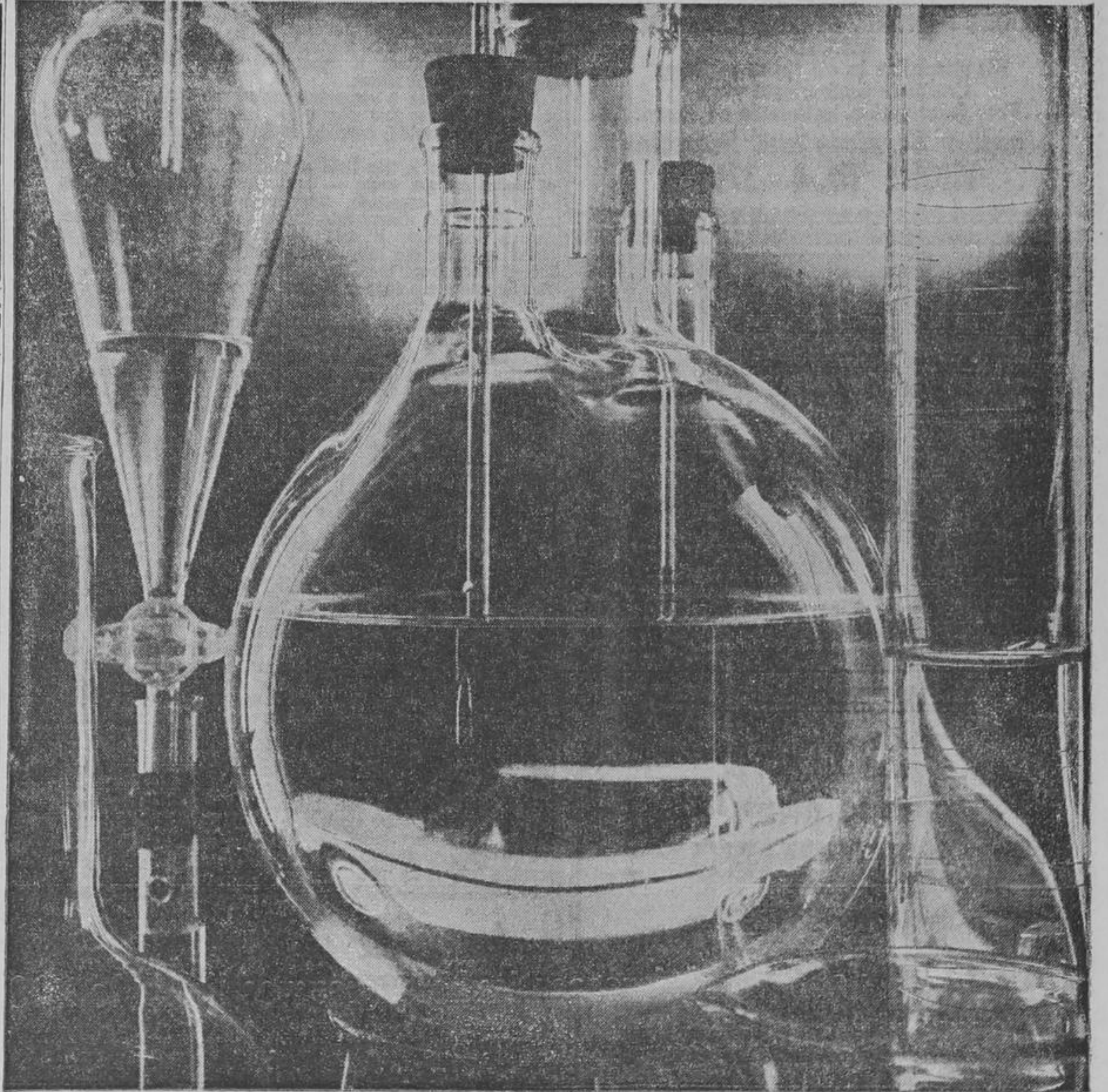
