TAKE NOTICE that the above mentioned  
Board of Trustees on the 20th day of June, 1962,  
passed By-law Number 23 to authorize the bor-  
rowing of money by the issue and sale of debentures  
of the said Board of Trustees in the prin-  
cipal amount of \$125,000.

1. The purpose for which the money is to be  
borrowed is the construction and equipment of an  
addition to the existing Roman Catholic Separate  
School in the Town of Richmond Hill.

2. The amount to be borrowed is \$125,000 on  
the security of the said Debentures, which shall  
be a charge upon the schoolhouse property and  
premises and any other real or personal property  
vested in the said Board of Trustees and upon the  
separate school rates collectible by the said Board  
of Trustees.

3. The Debentures are to be dated July 15,  
1962, are to bear interest at the rate of 6% per  
annum payable annually and are to be repayable  
in instalments of principal on July 15 in the years  
1963 to 1982, as follows:

I would like to thank the Ottawa and Richmond Hill Rotary Clubs for allowing me to participate in this 12th annual "Adventure in Citizenship."

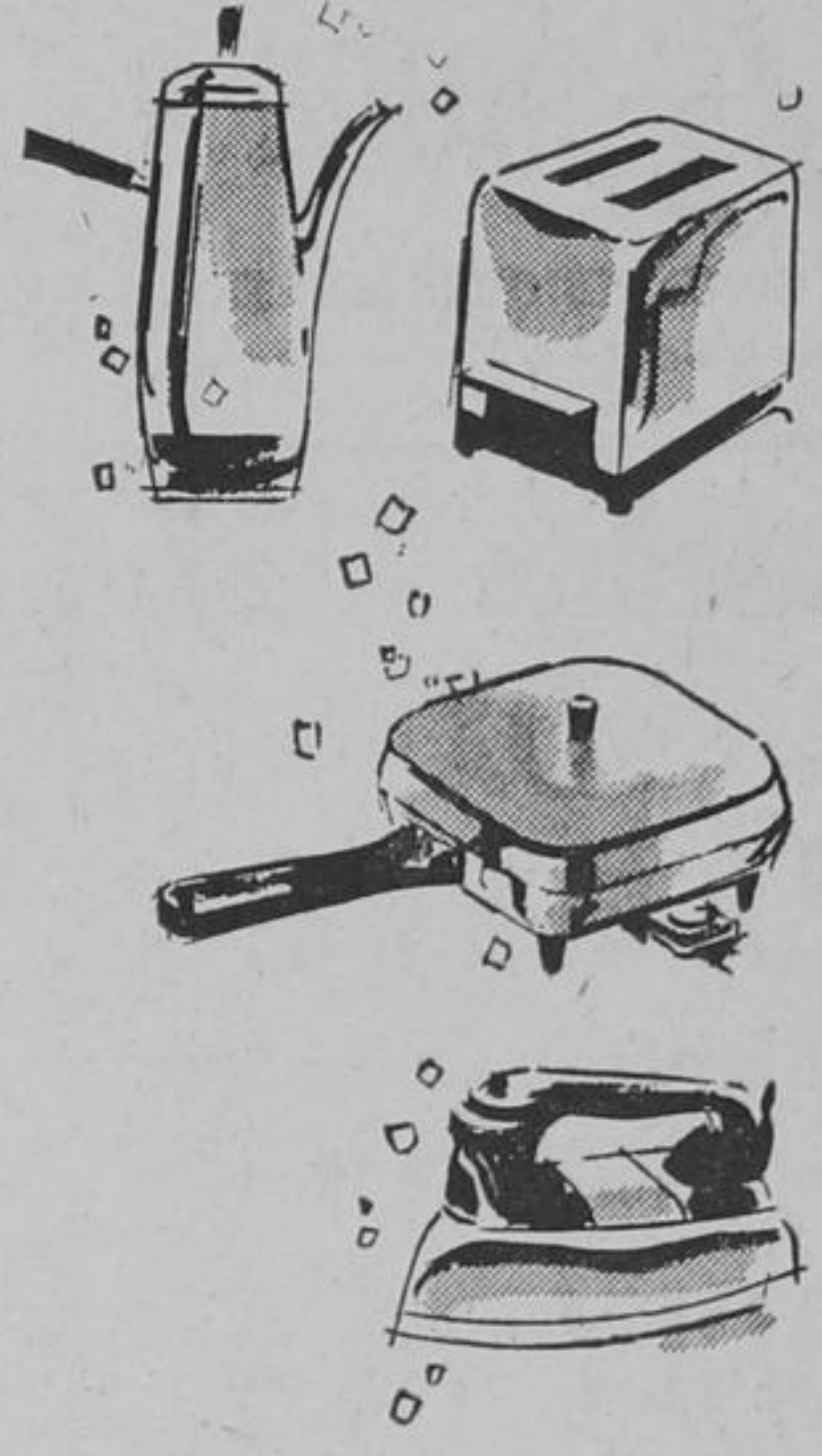
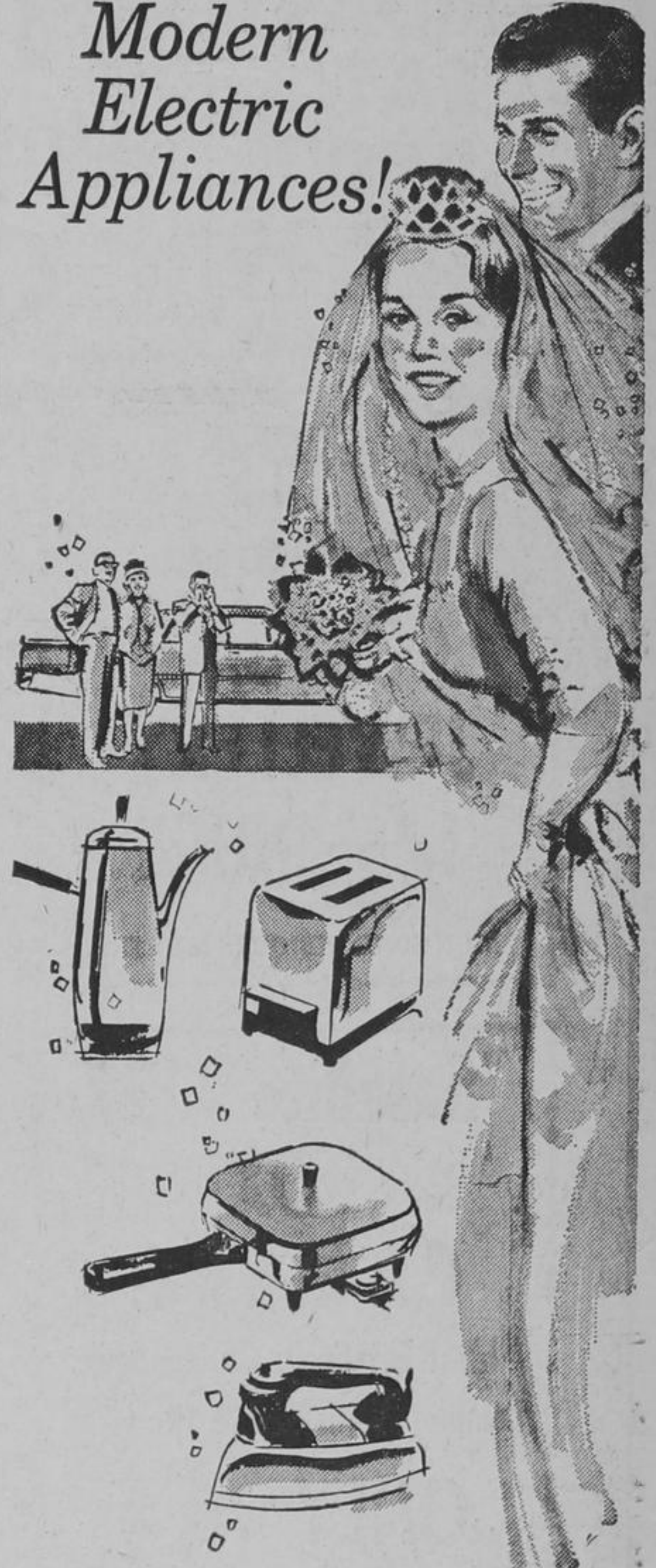

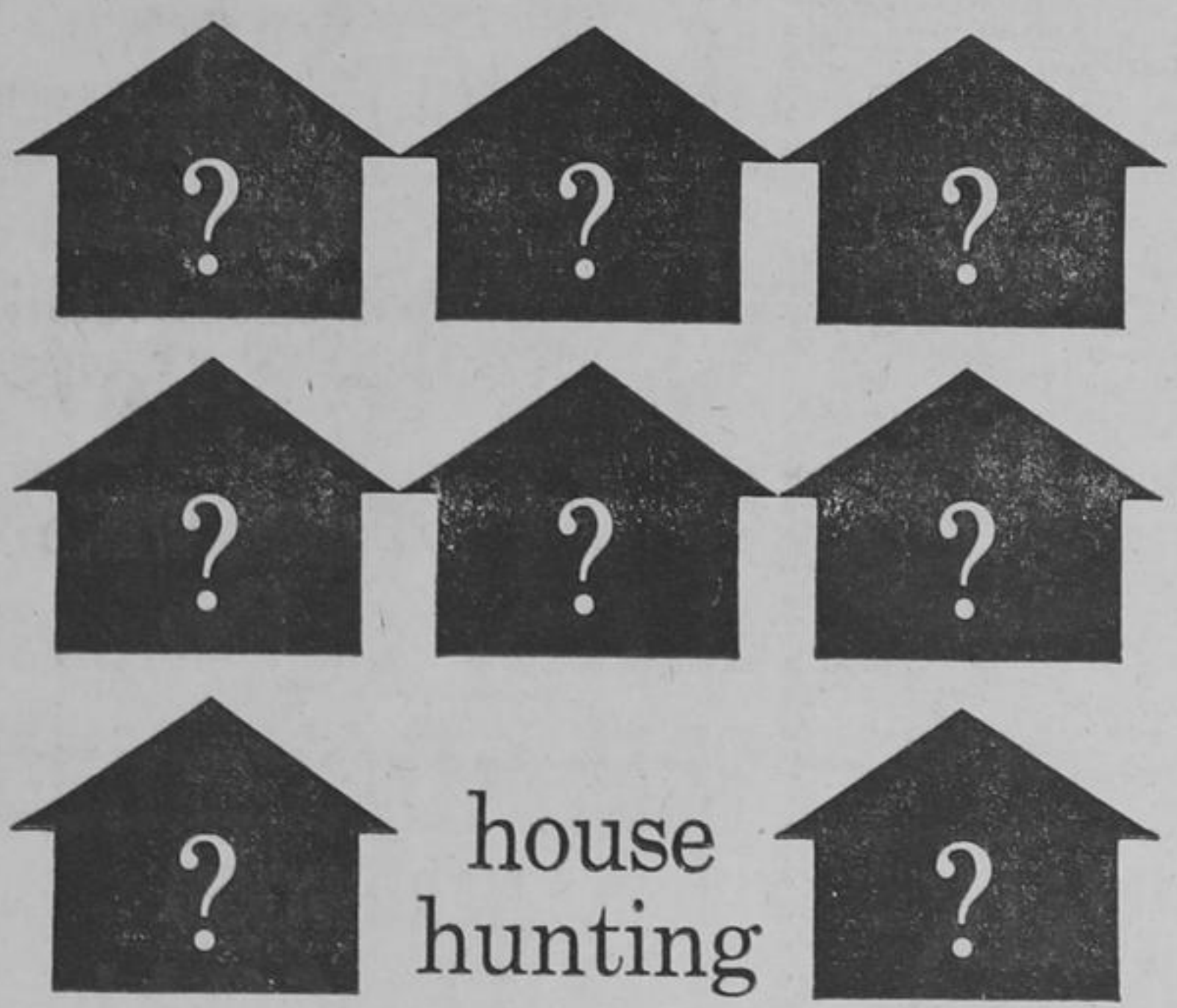
The group were entertained during the trip by J. Lowe's portable radio and by a sing-along with Fred Rose's harmonica.
