- 1. The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval of the construction of the watermains referred to in Schedule "A" hereto at an estimated cost of \$199,795.00 which amount shall be raised by the sale of debentures payable over a period not exceeding 20 years and intends to charge the cost thereof including debenture charges and the cost of maintenance and management upon the lands defined as the Edgeley Water Area more particularly described in paragraph 3 hereof.
- 2. It is proposed to raise the annual payments
 - (a) A special rate on all the rateable property in the said defined area not exceeding four mills in the dollar according to the assessed value thereof.
