Club Spends \$10,677 In Public Service Work

A total of \$10,677 was spent during the past year by the Richmond Hill Lions Club in public service work. In addition, a total of \$3,181 was spent in the operation of the Lions Community Hall.

The public service figure included \$1,600 raised by the club in conjunction with the Senior Citizens Club for the Easter Seals Campaign. Also included is \$956 raised in the Lions sponsored Red Shield Campaign for the Salvation Army.

The club divided its own expenditures into six categories. Spending on direct welfare added up to \$1,522. It also spent \$2,354 on youth activities and \$320 on scholarships.

York Central Hospital received almost \$3,500 from the club. Two thousand dollars were donated along with \$1,425 which was held in trust for the hospital.

Donations to charities amounted to \$500. Debt retirement on the Lions Community Hall totalled \$3,390.

The hall was operated on a self-supporting basis. Expenditures of \$3,181 were maintained in four categories. Maintenance of the hall, \$1,040, taxes, \$997, fuel, \$844, and utilities, \$300.

In the club's official report, they thanked the community for their support and expressed anticipation towards another year of community service.

This project was undertaken by all the W.I. clubs across Canada to be perpetuated as a historical site, and a suitable plaque will be erected on the site this fall.
