The language barrier contin-
ued to be a difficult problem,
though many Canadians soon
picked up a rough working
knowledge of Pashto, the local
language. Although the official
language of Pakistan is Eng-
lish, which is taught mostly at
the high school level or beyond,
the common language is Urdu,
to which Pashto is somewhat
similar.
A great majority of the Pak-
istanis are Muslims, one of
whose customs is strict adher-
ence to the rules of Ramadan.
During this period, which lasts
for a month, neither food nor
water may be taken between
sunrise and sunset, and as a
result labor output deteriorated
considerably.
Wages paid to Pakistani work-
men were based on an eight-hour
day, and varied from about a
rupee and a half per day for
straight labor to between six
and eight rupees for the higher
paid daily workers. A few were
paid as much as 12 rupees per
day. Transferred directly into
dollars this would mean between
30 cents and \$2.40 per day.
Although this looks ridicu-
lously low compared to our stan-
