

"LITTLE OLD LADY" CARS

How important is mileage in judging a used car's value? Not so important as condition, visible wear and dealer reputation.

Despite the fact that most folks shopping for a used car still let the speedometer influence them mightily, recorded mileage can be misleading in assessing a car's worth.

This is especially so today when manufacturers' advertising claims for reduced service on current models causes a tendency by drivers to regard their cars as mechanical wonders not requiring regular service as formerly.

Excessive engine wear causing oil burning in two- and three-year-old cars is fairly common. The reason is that short trip driving, if not accompanied by frequent oil changes, causes rapid sludge and varnish build-up. It is this chemical change in oil that causes most extensive wear.

Roughly one gallon of water is produced by a car's combustion system for every gallon of gas consumed. In a cold engine, instead of going out the exhaust pipe, this water condenses and runs into the crankcase, setting up sludge deposits. Sludge plugs engine oil passages in the rings, causing oil burning and ultimately varnish.

If your car gets a lot of this "little old lady" type of driving (frequent trips of less than eight miles) you will be well repaid by longer engine life and ultimately greater resale value to have your oil changes every 30 to 60 days even though your mileage is below maximum recommendations.

Teams using park grounds will charge no admission but will take a silver collection, council was informed.

There is no bylaw on the town's statute books prohibiting Sunday sports, nor is there one allowing them to be played. The Lord's Day Act prohibits sports to be played on Sunday although many communities in Canada have repealed it by plebiscite in recent years.

Councillor Al White said he saw nothing wrong with Sunday games provided they do not interfere with church services.

Prior to council voting on the motion Mr. Campbell asked the clerk to get a copy of the Lord's Day Act and read the section pertaining to Sunday games.

Mr. White objected to the request and asked that the motion be put before council for a vote.

Deputy-reeve Broadhurst, Councillors Al White and Mrs. Margaret Southwell voted in favor. Mr. Campbell was the only dissenting vote.

Overseas Visitor Sees YWCA Class In Action

A Pakistani visitor was one of the spectators at a Tuesday morning YWCA swimming class held at a district pool.

She is Miss Saeeda Nabi Bakhsh. Her visit to Canada is designed to show her how adult education is accomplished in this country, especially in more remote areas.

The class designed for mothers impressed Miss Bakhsh because it was being taught by volunteer workers.

"It is a wonderful thing that parents are so concerned for their children's safety that they will take time out for a course like this," she said. Miss Bakhsh noted that the high drowning rates in this country warrant such a course.

Miss Marion Foster of the national YWCA offices and Mrs. Edith Clement of the local YWCA also watched the classes.

Miss Bakhsh is in Canada on a UNESCO study grant. The three-month grant has already taken her to the United States and Scandinavia.

In Pakistan, she is principal of a Moslem girls' high school in Karachi which she founded herself.

An attempt is being made by the All-Pakistan Women's Association she represents to raise the country's literacy rate from its present 25 per cent. Chief problem is that 75 per cent of the population lives in isolated rural villages.
