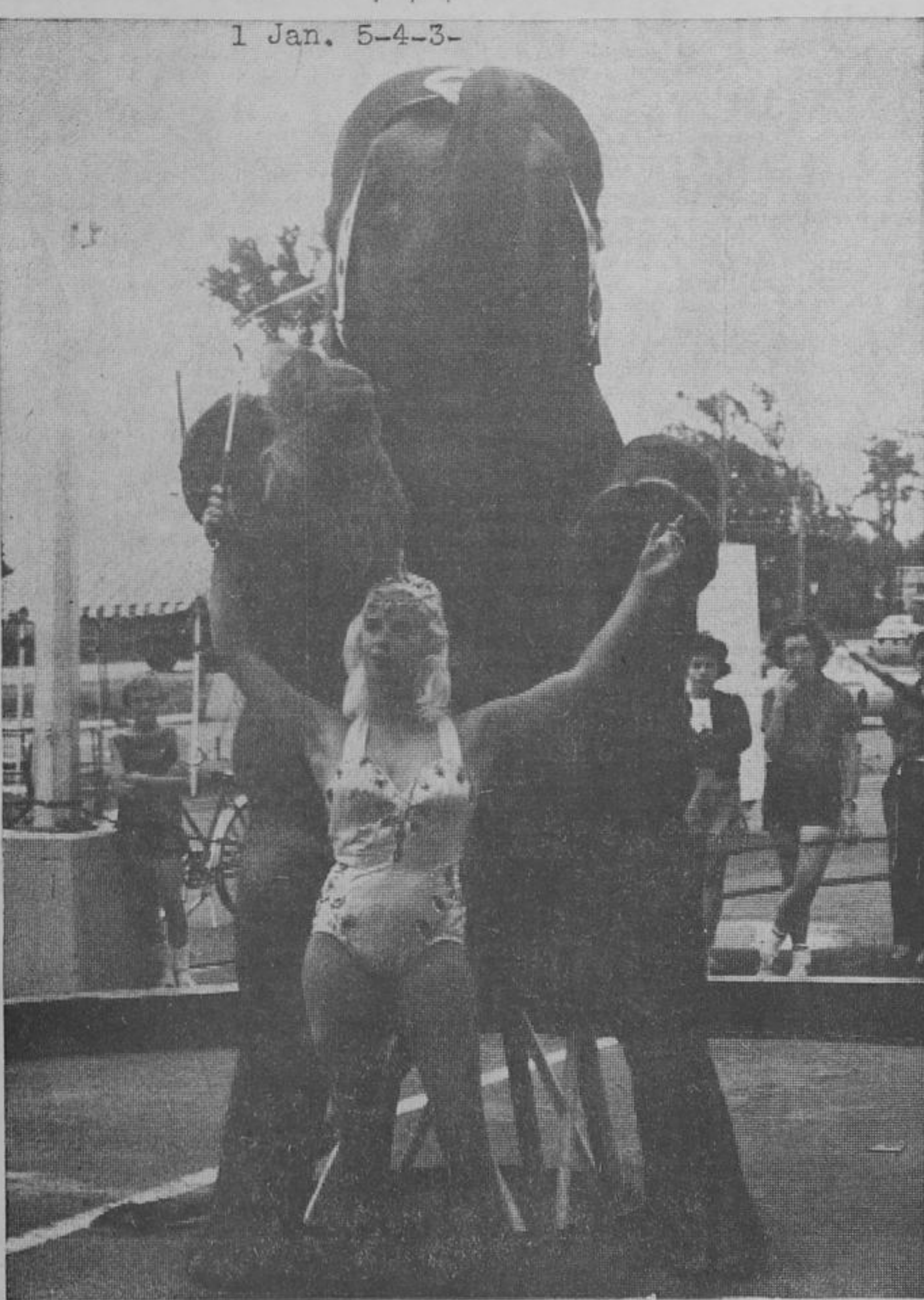

## Rap Bid To Form York - Wide Force

After over two years of intensive study, York County Council last week overwhelmingly turned thumbs down on a proposed county-wide police force. The vote was 19 to 9 against the motion sponsored by Deputy-reeve I. L. Mumberson of Markham Township.

Council's action followed study reports made in 1960 by County Court Judge Johnstone L. Roberts of Niagara Falls, and Magistrate C. O. Bick of Toronto, on all phases of setting up one police administration in the county.

Judge Roberts was appointed by the attorney-general's office to look into all aspects of a county force when council first ordered a study of the problem two years ago.

Judge Roberts was the founder of the provincial police college.

According to Mr. Mumberson, chairman of the police committee, a county force would be independent of county administration. It would be under the supervision of a county court judge, a police court judge and the county warden, he said.

J. H. Anderson, reeve of Georgina Township, asked how the cost for a county system would compare with present costs.

Mr. Mumberson replied: "You can't figure the protection of life and property in dollars and cents. That's the prime function of any law enforcement agency."

"The second and third functions are prevention of crime and apprehension of the criminal. Under the present system, no municipality can afford specialists for a criminal investigation branch," Mr. Mumberson stated.

"In a county this size, there should be four to six full time staff members on criminal investigation," he told council.

Reeve Floyd Perkins of Richmond Hill, who voted against the motion, questioned Mr. Mumberson the future of present municipal police buildings. He expressed a fear that substantial municipal investments in such buildings would go down the drain.

Head Office Here?

Head office of any county force would likely be in a large town such as Newmarket or Richmond Hill, Mr. Mumberson predicted. Detachments scattered across the county would occupy many police buildings at the outset, he added.

However, Mr. Mumberson was of the opinion there would be a shortage of available jail cells in the near future, and that most buildings would probably have to be utilized.

"I think the recent explosion in Maple proved the efficiency of the county's present mutual-aid system," said Reeve Albert Rutherford of Vaughan Township. "The system seems to be capable of coping with any emergency."

Deputy-reeve Jesse A. Bryson supported his views. "We in Vaughan are pretty proud of the amalgamated police and fire departments we have now. We would be pretty reluctant to give it up unless we were sure we had something better to replace it."

## Blast Damage Will Likely Hit \$50,000 Mark

Damage to the Vaughan Township municipal building from the recent explosion and fire at the Superior Propane plant in Maple will hit the \$50,000 figure, according to township engineers Duncan and Hopper.

The north window-wall will have to be almost completely replaced as well as part of the south wall. Majority of the inside partition walls are needing repairs and ceilings are twisted out of shape, Mr. Hopper told "The Liberal" Tuesday.

He said that repairs are now underway but could give no date as to when they would be completed.

## Boy Nine, Killed In Tractor Fall Monday Evening

Robert Stokes, nine-year-old only son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stokes, Thornhill, died Monday night minutes after falling from the front-end loader of a farm tractor near his home.

He was crushed to death when the single front wheel of the tractor passed over his chest, Markham Township police said. Police say he had been sitting in the bucket-shaped loader with two companions when the accident happened.

The mishap occurred at the Yonge Street home of 17-year-old Victor Winkles, driver of the tractor, police said.

Raymond Wintjes, 12, brother of the driver, and Christopher Van Deer, 9, Thornhill, were seated in the loader with Robert, according to police.

They told police the youngster was excited as it was his first tractor ride. He either stood up and fell or jumped from the loader, they said.

Robert was pronounced dead on arrival at Branson Hospital.

## Three Flee Red China Hired By Local Firm

A Richmond Hill restaurant owner said this week that Canada should admit 10,000 Chinese refugees under the federal government plan to help families fleeing from Communist China.

Lou S. Hein, owner of the Yangtze Pagoda restaurant on Yonge Street, has hired three of the refugees who arrived at Malton Airport last week from Hong Kong.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker promised a home in Canada to 100 families earlier this year, when Chinese fleeing Communist oppression thronged into Hong Kong by the hundreds of thousands.

Mr. Hein said the government's plan is a step in the right direction, but suggested it was "only a drop in the bucket."

"There is always a demand for help in Chinese restaurants. Some have been forced to close because they couldn't get enough help," Mr. Hein said.

He predicted that the food business alone could employ thousands of refugees to meet the acute shortage of personnel.

Mr. Hein has employed Chan Wah Cheung and Chan Lung Hing to work in his restaurant. Chan Lung Hing's wife will be a housemaid in his home.

## Ban Firearms In Built - Up Areas Of Markham Twp.

Markham Township Council Monday afternoon gave first and second reading to a bylaw which would prohibit the use of firearms in the built-up areas of the township.

The bylaw will apply to the area between Yonge Street and Bayview Avenue as well as the area south of Highway 7 and as far west as Con. 8.

Penalty for violation of the bylaw is \$300.

Farmers in the area would be able to use firearms of under 12 gauge or less to protect their property. In addition, organized hunts or shooting matches will be permitted.

## Town To Review Gas Regulations

Councillor Al White, chairman of Richmond Hill Planning and Development Committee, said this week that town council has no authority to order removal of the existing propane storage plant of Altane Ltd., on Markham Road.

Ken's decision to stay in the race came after his time trials last week. He swam five miles in one hour, 36 minutes, his fastest time ever. According to Ken, a winning time for that distance would be one hour, 44 minutes.

However, his improved showing in the trials was encouraging enough that he has stepped up his training program. He now spends two and one-half hours in Lake Ontario nightly.

Roadwork has been cut out because it can cause swimming cramps. However, he is keeping up his calisthenics.

Ken has had to change coaches because of CNE swim rules. George Wiskin of North York Lion's Club replaces Murray Van Nooten to conform to the rules that entrants must have pro coaches.

## Perkins Says 'Yes' Broadhurst 'No'

Signs of dissension between members of Richmond Hill Council were evident at last week's session of York County Council when Reeve Floyd Perkins spoke out strongly in support of a county welfare plan in the face of marked opposition from Deputy-reeve Thomas Broadhurst.

Plurality vote on a motion, which would send county officials to the Minister of Public Welfare to discuss the proposed county-wide system, was passed 33 to 16. The plan, if accepted, would serve as a pilot project for the province.

## Local Officials To Visit Europe On Study Tour

Four local municipal officials will be among those visiting Europe starting Sept. 3 as part of a study tour.

Purpose of the trip is to give municipal officials a chance to see the way local government functions in Europe.

Richmond Hill Reeve Floyd Perkins and his wife, along with Reeve Albert Rutherford of Vaughan Township, will represent York County.

H. C. T. Crisp and Jim McDonald, clerks of Markham and Vaughan Township respectively, will represent their own municipalities.

The tour is sponsored jointly by the Ontario Municipal Association and Queen's University. Delegates taking part in the tour will be rural and urban representatives of the Ontario Municipal Board and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

All delegates will visit England to observe their local government. After that they will split into two groups.

One group, including Mr. and Mrs. Perkins, Mr. Rutherford and Mr. Crisp, will visit Holland and Denmark. Mr. McDonald's group will visit Sweden and Denmark.
