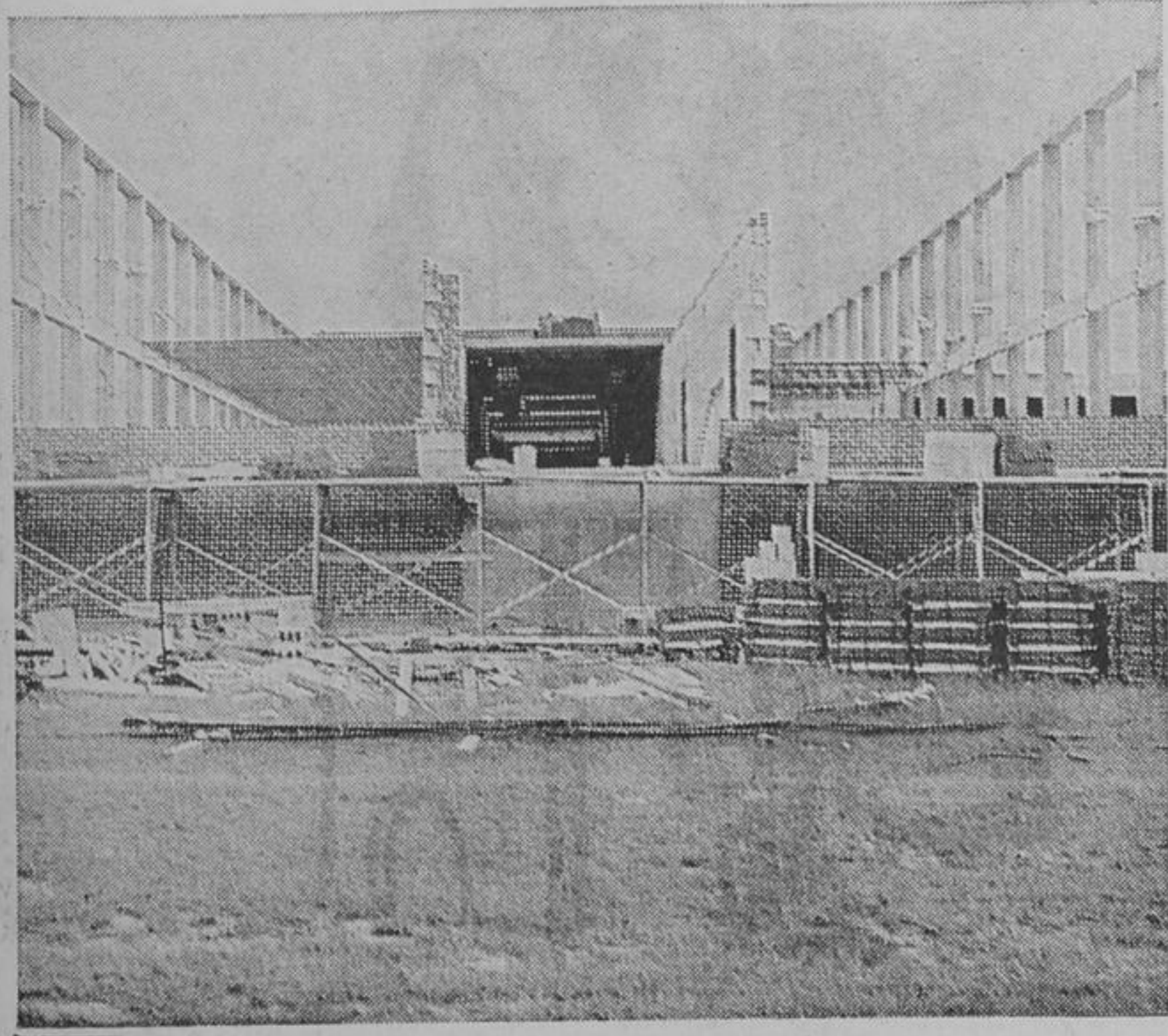

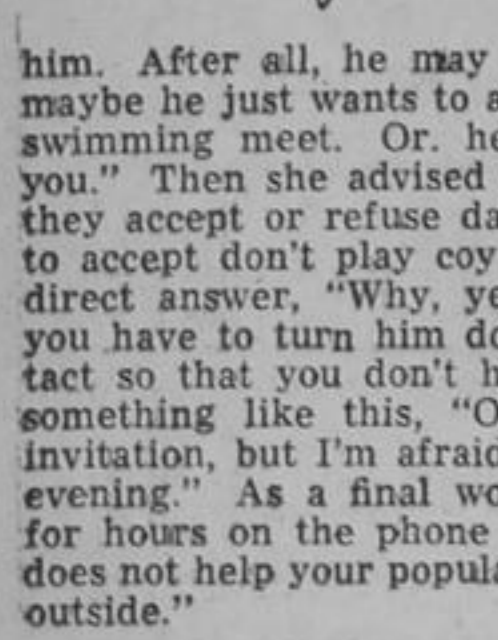
Make your phone work for you

Held At Thornhill Pool

Marianne Gain Of Doncaster Is '62 Synchronized Swimming Champion

A handsome rose-bowl trophy, filled with deep red sweetheart roses, was proudly carried off by Marianne Gain, of 26 Henderson Avenue, Doncaster, following the synchronized swimming competition held at the Thornhill Pool on August 10th.

Marianne came first in a field of seven competitors, winning a total of 300 points, out of a possible 420.

Second place winner was Liz Duncan with 275 points and Stephanie Bean was third with 260 points.

The seven competitors, all senior swimming students, have been practising at the pool all summer, either at an 8 a.m. class or in the evening from 9 to 10 p.m., instructed by Pat Vlassoff and Ann Jeffery. Judges for the competition were Carolyn Jennings and Anne Rogers, while Ann Jeffery was referee.

The girls were judged under three classifications, strokes, figures and a solo performance.

Each competitor demonstrated her breast stroke, side, back breast, head first sculling and propeller strokes. Marianne Gain came first in this classification with Liz Duncan second and Cathie Percival third.

The figures the girls demonstrated were the Kip, Dolphin, Shark, Somer Sub, Jack Knife and Ballet leg. First in this classification was Liz Duncan with Marianne Gain second and Stephanie Bean third.

For the solo number, each girl performed an original sequence of figures and strokes composed by themselves to fit a piece of music of their own choice.

Prizewinner in this category was Marianne Gain whose solo was entitled "Teacher's Pet" and was done to the accompaniment of "Do Re Me" from the musicale "Sound of Music".

Liz Duncan took second prize with her solo entitled "Salome, Salome, You're Full of Baloney" which was performed to the tune of "Istanbul". (And I would have awarded her a prize for the most original title).

Third prize was given to Stephanie Bean for her "Baby Elephant Walk".

Just before the girls did their solo numbers there was an excellent diving exhibition given by John Hanna and Ted McGhee.

The trophy, which was awarded by M. Rawlinson Limited, was presented by Mr. Ed Windsor.

This is the first time since 1957 that the synchronized swimming competition has been held, but it is hoped to make it an annual event.

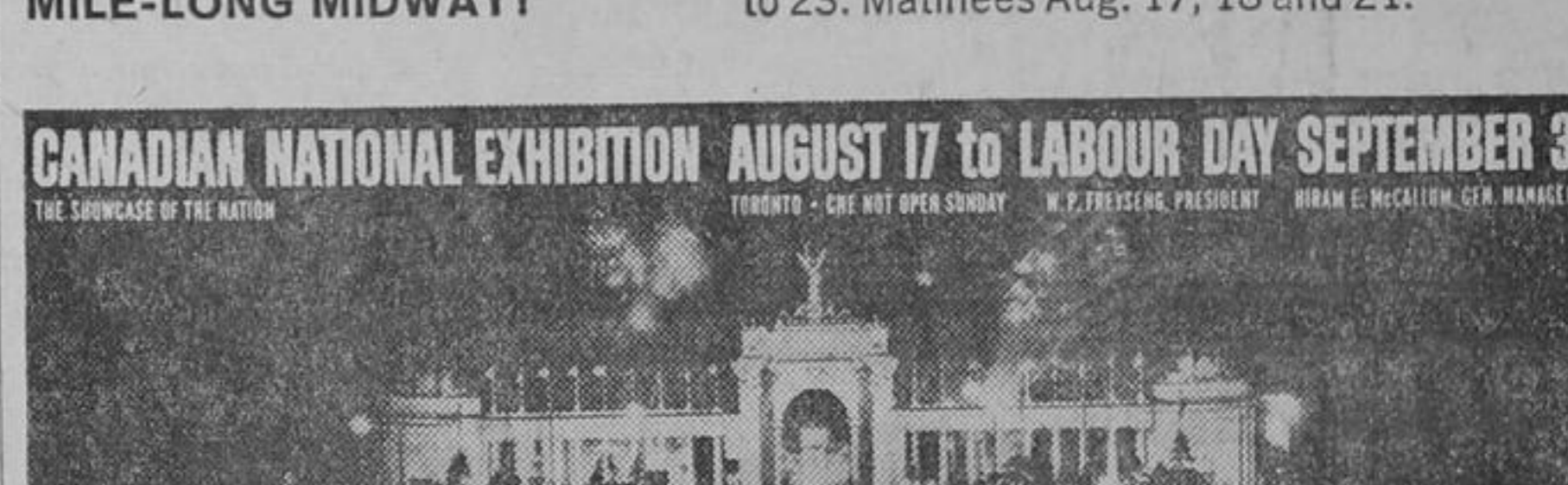
