## Dynes Win Opener 10-2

Dynes Jewellers got off to a flying start as they defeated Aurora 10-2 in the opening game of the OASA campaign.

The Jewellers were "up" for this game, while Aurora seemed jittery and committed errors that proved to be very costly.

Norm Roberts drew the pitching assignment for the Jewellers and gave up six hits over the nine inning distance. Norm Stunden started for Aurora but gave way to veteran Bill Bowen after pitching two and two third innings. Stunden was tagged for five hits and gave up five runs as errors permitted the Jewellers to score freely.

Bowen yielded five more hits to the Jewellers and they added five more runs with Bowen on the mound.

Skip De Geer opened by grounding out to Don Gibson at first base and the next batter, Gary Smith, drew a walk. An infield error on a hard smash by Moe Williamson moved Smith to second with Williamson pulling up safe on first.

Don MacMillan bounced a shot down the third base line that was the third base line bases. Norm Roberts hit into a fielder's choice that forced Smith at the plate but left the bags loaded. A double through the middle by Chico Fernandez scored Williamson and MacMillan and the Jewellers were on their way.

Two more Dynes runs were added in the second inning. Skip De Geer had singled and was on first base. A sharp single by Gary Smith was momentarily bobbled and the fleet Smith was on his way. His speed on the base paths seemed to unnerve the Aurora team and by the time they settled down, Smith had chased De Geer across the plate to add two more runs.

Aurora scored their second and last run of the game in the third inning. Scott led off with a single and was scored on a single by catcher Jim Patten. Aurora threatened to add to their two run total on occasion but sound defensive ball by the Jewellers effectively squelched any scoring bids.

**Bowen In Relief**  
In the third inning with two

men out and the Jewellers mounting a 5-2 lead, Bill Bowen came in to relieve Norm Stunden. Bill Robson was already on second after pounding out a double and Bowen gave up a walk to Ken Roberts.

An error on an easy dribbler by Cal Williams loaded the bases and a single by De Geer scored Robson and left the bases loaded. Bowen seemed to be in real trouble but fanned Smith to put out the fire.

Dynes added another run in the fourth inning and two more in the sixth. Bill Robson hoisted a home run blast over the left field fence in the seventh inning with the bases empty to end the Jeweller scoring spree.

Norm Roberts got great support from his team mates throughout the game. The outfield play of Gary Smith and Chico Fernandez was nothing short of sensational as they went miles to turn certain hits into routine outs. If the Jewellers continue to play to their present form, this could be a short series.
