Hill Officials Don't Agree On County Welfare Plan

(Continued From Page 1)
 "People needing help will still come to their municipality asking for it," suggested Deputy-revee Bryson. "We will still have to process such cases before they go to the county."
 Reeve Dean and Deputy-revee Lawson Mumberson of Markham Township both favored the county plan.
 According to the report, only two full-time welfare officers are presently employed in the county — one for Vaughan Township and one shared by Markham Township and Richmond Hill.

In many municipalities the clerk, police chief, road superintendent or a member of the police force handles the duties of the welfare officer. In two cases, a real estate salesman and a council member serve as part-time welfare officers.
 Reeve Dean alleged that the position of the council member who handled welfare is shameful. "He'll be asking people who are on welfare for votes on election day."

Decision by the welfare committee to include such a motion in their report was not unanimous, Mrs. A. Walker, reeve of Markham Village, and a member of the committee, said.
 "The motion does not commit the county to go ahead with the plan. A bylaw would be necessary," said Reeve J. O. Dales of North Gwillimburgh Township.

"The motion would just send the county's representatives down to talk to provincial authorities," he added.
 Mr. Mumberson claimed that county officials are most interested in just how much of the bill for a county system would be footed by the province.

of a welfare setup was included in the report. A county welfare board, possibly including members of county council, would administer the proposed system. It would meet weekly.
 At the outset, the welfare staff would include a director and four field workers.

The charts also showed that the municipalities' share of welfare expenditures had jumped from 13.8 per cent in 1959, to 29.43 per cent in 1961.
 Deputy-revee R. G. Henderson of Woodbridge criticized the inclusion of the charts in the report.
 "They make it look like the report of a mining company which is trying to justify the high salaries of its employees," he said. "I think somebody's trying to put something over on the county."

Reeve Norm Garriock of Woodbridge, also expressed strong opposition, both to the report and to the motion. After having one portion of the report read back to him, he commented, "Balderdash!"
 Later he explained that he thought the report was a bad one. "The county is usurping too much of the local municipalities' power."
