Brian was also awarded a medal for the highest boy and Karen Glassow won the medal for the highest girl in the diving competition.

Mother, Son Top Pupils At District High School

One of the names in this year's list of Grade 13 graduates at Thornhill Secondary School had a Mrs. in front of it.

The name was Mrs. Margaret Heron, who finished near the top of her class with seven firsts and two seconds.

Mrs. Heron, 33, was forced to leave school to work after Grade 11, when she was only 16. "I think I was doing fairly well," she recalls now. "I had to quit but it was not my decision. I liked school."

Two hours of homework before and two hours after supper was Mrs. Heron's usual diet throughout the school year.

"Everything seemed so interesting that I didn't mind the homework at all," Mrs. Heron states. "I even looked forward to going to classes."

Mrs. Heron suggests that school may be a little easier for a mature adult. "You can look at things more objectively," she explains. "When I went to school before I concentrated on the subjects that I liked and were easy for me. Last year I concentrated on subjects more difficult for me."

Her son, Richard, will go into Grade 11 this year. His average was 72 per cent. Only 14, he was accelerated one year.

French was Mrs. Heron's toughest subject. She had to enter a class where French was used in the classroom all the time.

Mrs. Heron's big impression of her year at Thornhill was of friendliness. "The teachers were always friendly and I was part of the student group right from the start," she remembers.

"I was surprised, too, at how mature my fellow students seemed," she said.

Mrs. Heron expects to enter York University next month to study in the faculty of arts, stressing English, French and psychology.
