**For Public, High
 Science Texts Are Written
 By Area School Official**

Markham Village and Township School Inspector, Maynard Hallman, is co-author of one of the many new series of science texts which will be available this fall in Ontario public and high schools.

Recent changes in Ontario's science program have created the need for new texts. Standards have been generally upgraded this year and courses of study completely reorganized.

Mr. Hallman claims the standards in the physical sciences have received more emphasis in the new course. His texts are Intermediate Science 1, 2, 3 and 4 for Grades 7, 8, 9 and

10, published by Holt, Rinehart and Winston.

The texts are the third set he has helped write. In 1950, he wrote a social studies text called "Canadians at Work".

In 1961, he completed a set of five science texts for use in the Prairie provinces.

Mr. Hallman shared authorship of the texts with four other men. Three public school principals worked with him on the Grade 7 text — Karl Kinzinger of Thornlea, Malcolm McRoberts of Powell Road school in Vaughan Township and Howard Gillies of St. Catharines.

Mr. Gillies and Stanley Taylor of Royal York Collegiate Institute, Etobicoke, helped Mr. Hallman write the Grade 8 and 9 texts.

Mr. Taylor and Mr. Hallman were co-authors of the Grade 10 text.

The five writers began work on their mammoth project in 1959 and only recently completed the Grade 10 text.

Each author wrote a specific section of each text. Mr. Hallman concentrated on the physical sciences.

Later, they cross-checked each other's work for accuracy and readability.

The task of organizing the almost 1,200 pages of text is not as insurmountable as it might

appear to the uninitiated.

Mr. Hallman and his associates followed almost exactly the provincial course of study which is outlined in some detail.

Even with the problem of organization solved, Mr. Hallman spent almost all of his free time — holidays, weekends and evenings — from 1958 to 1962 preparing the text.

It was not unusual, he said, for he and the co-authors to sit up discussing the texts until the wee small hours of the morning.

He tried to develop an interesting introduction to each topic to arouse the interest of the student. The introduction is followed by a series of activities or experiments, then problems to be solved.

Mr. Hallman suggested ways of conducting experiments with home-made equipment. This enables the smallest school to provide a well-rounded science course.

An effort was made by Mr. Hallman and his associates to keep the texts up-to-date — a difficult thing to do, he says. John Glenn was discussed in the Grade 8 book.

Most of the illustrations are done by professional artists. However, Mr. Hallman's son, Grant, did some of the photography.

Mr. Hallman came to his present job in Richmond Hill in 1953.
