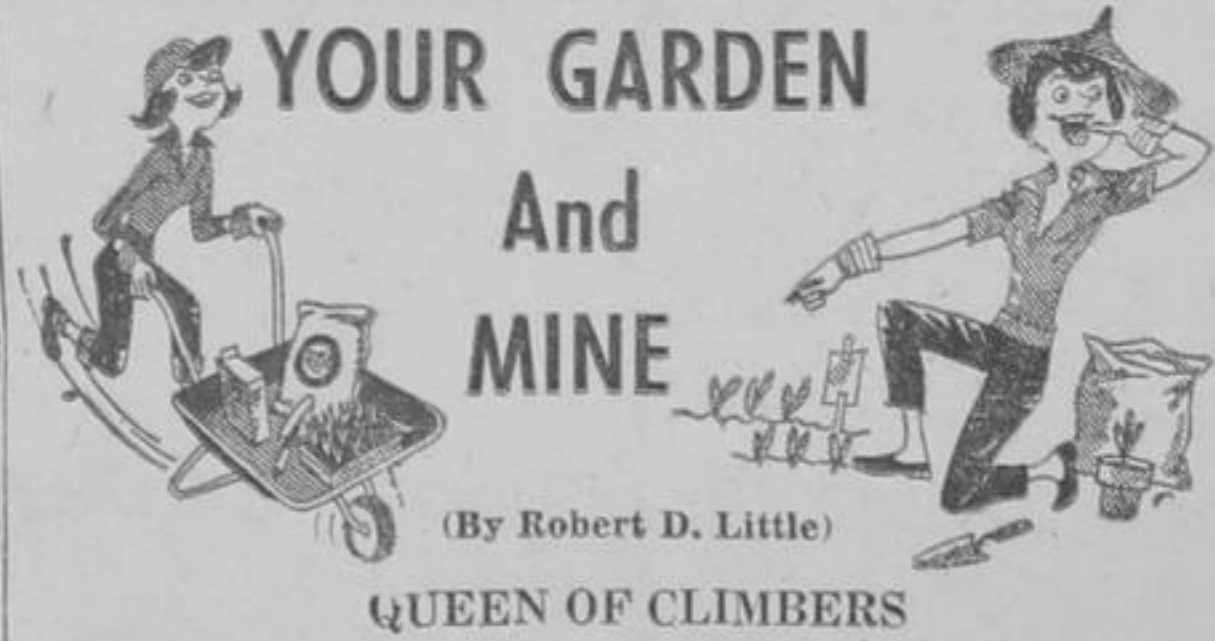

YOUR GARDEN And MINE (By Robert D. Little) QUEEN OF CLIMBERS

The Clematis has been called the queen of Climbers. No doubt one reason for this queenship is that there are few plants that are so graceful or colorful. The large flowering hybrids produce masses of bloom, many up to seven or eight inches across. The color harmonies are most attractive; mauve pink with brown stamens, lavender blue with white stamens, and white with stamens of a bluish shade.

Clematis has never been subjected to the vagaries or whims of style. To gardeners of an older generation, the purple flowers of Clematis jackmanii were a must to cover a trellis or the front porch, and there they bloomed faithfully, year after year, sometimes for half a century. But to the modern gardener, there is a feast of beauty in the new varieties and hybrids, which have a long range of color and size along with new vitality. In England the clematis is second only to the rose in popularity - it is sometimes called withy-wind, sweet autumn and old man's beard. We shall never forget the breathtaking sight of the Clematis exhibit when we visited the Chelsea Flower Show in London in 1958. The range of color and size of flowers was amazing. Of course many of the varieties shown thrive in the English climate, but are not sufficiently hardy for Canadian winters.

There are, however, many varieties that will grow well in this area if properly planted and taken care of. After jackmanii probably the most popular variety is Nelly Moser with a deep carmine bar. We have been successful with Henry, a very fine white with a touch of blue on the stamens. Duchess of Edinburgh is a double flowered white with a bluish cast; Ramona a very large lavender blue; Comtesse de Bouchard a rose pink and Crimson King a striking deep red.

Clematis can be grown on fences, trellises and walls. While not a rampant grower it is an excellent climber and will cover a fairly large space. Do not become discouraged if the bloom is shy for two or three years. The variety Comtesse de Bouchard grew wonderfully for us for two years, but no flowers. This year it covered a space of several feet on a fence and one could scarcely see the leaves for the flowers.

The best time to plant Clematis is in the spring, but they may also be planted with success in September. They like a good loamy soil enriched with
