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BONDS SELL OVER PAR AT 100.028

Sale of 20-year debenture bonds to Greenshields Incorporated, Toronto, totalling \$190,000 at above par value was ratified Monday night by Richmond Hill Town Council.

Offering \$100.028 per hundred dollars, the company was the highest bidder among 12 firms that tendered. Interest on the debentures is six per cent per annum.

Of the money raised, \$179,000 will pay for the addition to Crosby Heights Public School and the remaining \$11,000 will be used to cover a local improvement bylaw.

Other companies bidding were Mills-Spence & Co. Ltd., 97.83; Dominion Securities Corp. Ltd., 99.02; Harris & Partners Ltd., 99.07; Wood-Gundy & Co. Ltd., 98.92; R. A. Daly & Co., Ltd., 99.08; J. L. Graham & Co., Ltd., 98.05.

Bell-Gouinlock & Co., Ltd., 99.08; Nesbitt-Thompson & Co. Ltd., 99.05; A. E. Ames & Co., Ltd., 98.5; Midland Securities Ltd., 98.05 and Gairdner & Co. Ltd., 98.75.

Before the tenders were opened Councillor Alec Campbell, an employee of A. E. Ames & Co., declared an interest in the bidding and refrained from the discussion and vote.

Commenting on the sale, Mayor James Haggart said Richmond Hill saved money by waiting until the bond market was favorable.

He said the bid in excess of par value and the number of companies tendering reflected the sound financial condition of the town.

Predicting an increased assessment this year, Mr. Haggart said the town in future will attract investors. He also noted a reduction in the town's overall debenture debt during 1962.

Stressing the need for a sound financial basis, Councillor Campbell warned the town must live within its means.

"We will be in trouble if we don't," he stated.

He said Richmond Hill's economic condition is progressing favorably and urged that it be maintained.

The company stipulated in its offer to purchase, the town refrain from offering for sale any further debentures for a 60 day period.

Delivery date requested was Nov. 1.

May Join Police In 5 Areas

Amalgamation of at least some of the police forces in the county may take place in the not too-distant future.

At a joint meeting of councils of five northern municipalities, a committee was set up to study the question of amalgamation.

The five municipalities represented were Whitchurch,

King Township, Aurora, Newmarket and East Gwillimbury. Each council agreed to name a representative to the committee.

They will study two possible set-ups. One joint police proposal will cover Whitchurch, King and Aurora.

A second would cover those three along with Newmarket and East Gwillimbury.

Whitchurch and King were forced to make some decision on their police force when they were notified recently that the Ontario Provincial Police will withdraw from the two townships after March of next year.

York County Council last month turned down a proposed amalgamated police force for the whole county.

George Medal Is Recommended For Herb Joslin

Ontario Welfare Minister Louis Cecil has recommended that Herbert Joslin be awarded the George Medal posthumously for his attempt to prevent the explosion of the Superior Propane plant in Maple on August 4, "The Liberal" learned Monday.

Mr. Cecil recommended the award in a letter to Secretary of State C. Ernest Halpenny last week.

Investigation by the welfare department showed that Mr. Joslin acted with a high conception of duty when he rushed into the plant last month to try to stop a propane gas leak, the minister said.

He noted that Mr. Joslin, who was a stock clerk for Superior Propane, knew the danger he faced, but did not hesitate.

A series of explosions which rocked the area resulted when the leaking gas was ignited.

Mr. Joslin was fatally injured in the first of the explosions.

Mail Delivery Starts Oct. 1

Postmaster E. T. Willis announced this week that house to house mail delivery will commence in the area south of Richmond Hill on October 1st.

Mr. Willis said the area bounded by Carrville Road West, Bathurst Street and Yonge Street will receive the new service on that date. Both Hillside Drive and Observatory Lane on the east side of Yonge St. will be served by group mail boxes.

At Next Meeting

Table Convention Costs Promises Finance Chief

Councillor John MacDiarmid said Monday his request for an inspection of Richmond Hill officials' convention expenditures was not directed at any one individual.

At a meeting Sept. 10 he asked for a review of funds spent by town employees and elected officials attending conventions and a complete study of the convention policy.

He said his intention was to secure the total spent during 1961 as compared to this year for each department.

"I have no idea if it is \$1,000 or \$10,000. Nor do

I know if it's more or less than last year. I only want to clarify the situation", Mr. MacDiarmid informed council.

He was of the opinion there could be a breakdown of convention costs for every department and suggested a general account be set up.

Mayor James Haggart disagreed. He said a general account was unnecessary claiming convention expenses of each department should be assessed separately.

He added that all expenditures are included in the budget

and council has had no indication from the finance committee this year's budget is overspent.

Deputy-reve Thos. Broadhurst, chairman of the finance committee, promised full information would be tabled at the next meeting. Stating the committee has nothing to hide, Mr. Broadhurst asserted he will outline clearly all convention expenses.

He invited the inspection by any taxpayer of municipal accounting and said the books are a public record open for scrutiny during office hours.

The chairman stated that serious consideration is given to disbursements when the budget is drawn up.

Information as to the number of officials attending conventions this year was requested by Councillor Al White.

The finance chairman said he would also make this knowledge available next meeting.

Applications Very Heavy

Expect Liquor License Hearing In November

All indications point to a record number of applications for dining room and cocktail liquor licenses in Richmond Hill.

A well-informed source, who asked that his name not be used, told "The Liberal" Wednesday that over 10 applications have been received by the Liquor Control Board of Ontario from local and outside interests.

No date has been set for a hearing on the applications but the LCBO when contacted said it probably would be held late in November.

A Shirley, deputy-registrar for the board, said the board is still screening applicants.

He explained that it was possible only a few would receive a hearing. The board pre-screens all applications and then picks the ones it

feels could qualify for the type of license applied for. The official said this was standard practice as some applicants cannot meet the requirements laid down by the board.

Once a date has been set, advertisements will be placed in the local press six weeks in advance naming the applicants and type of license requested.

Mr. Shirley said individuals or groups are permitted to appear at the hearing if they wish to lodge a protest against any particular application.

He would not confirm or deny whether a license had been requested for the proposed hotel on Yonge Street North.

Richmond Hill is in district six under the board's jurisdiction.
