May Send School Books To Commonwealth Areas

Vaughan Township School, Area Board at its meeting last Thursday night, decided to ask the Ontario Teachers' Federation for more information about the need for good, used textbooks and children's books in schools of under-developed Commonwealth countries.

Educationists and others in these less fortunate lands, contacted by the federation, confirmed the need is great and any assistance would be greatly appreciated.

Of interest is an extract from a letter from the Commissioner for Canada in Trinidad.

"... anything that you can do in this line will be of great help in this area, nor need you confine your activities to school books only because you will find that a shortage of books of all kinds is acute in this area. There is a particular shortage of children's books and I can assure you that if you can arrange to collect any children's books, they will be equally welcome."

In the September Ontario School Trustees' Council bulletin, the federation suggests the most satisfactory arrangement would be a school-to-school project whereby individual schools in Ontario would be put in touch with individual schools in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, etc., and would send books directly to the Commonwealth school concerned.

The area board has a supply of books available, and members were unanimously in favour of disposing of them in this manner.

Receipts for the first half of the year total \$10,693. The 1963 budget calls for \$24,216. Full rally of the organization is slated for the Aurora United Church, October 30.

35 Delegates Attend York Women Meeting Zephyr United Church played host to 35 delegates at an executive meeting of the York Presbyterian United Church Women.

Mrs. J. Roderick of Brown's Corner United Church was appointed program convener of the executive.

Purchase of blackout drapes for three public schools was approved by the Richmond Hill School Board last week.

Drapes for Walter Scott, Crosby Heights and Beverley Acres will cost the Board \$798. They were purchased from Fabric Fair Ltd., Richmond Hill.

A change in Ontario's sales tax structure will cost the board about \$870.

Sales tax applies to about 80 per cent of school supplies according to Chairman Harold Sanderson. Formerly school supplies were tax-exempt.

Cost of the supplies, which are now taxable, is \$29,000.
