2 Year Well Search Costs \$9,000

After a two year search costing \$9,000, King City Village Trustees report a suitable site has been found for a third water well.

Located a few hundred feet north west of the present two wells in the Humber valley, the larger supply of water has been located at a depth of 330 feet.

International Water Supply Company, which has test-drilled several locations on the village borders, guarantees a supply of 200 imperial gallons per minute, twice the existing supply.

Trustees were told it is possible the well can be developed further to supply 500 gallons a minute.

"All we need now is the money to develop the well," Village Chairman Robert O'Reilly told "The Liberal". He estimated \$40,000 in debentures might be needed.

A bulletin released by trustees said: "Negotiations are in progress between trustees, Proctor and Redfern, consulting engineers and International Water Supply to develop an initial guaranteed minimum supply of 200 IGPM."

In the meantime all outdoor watering is still banned so that the lowering water table will be sufficient for domestic use.

Police Amalgamation Likely For Five Areas

An amalgamated police force serving either three or five municipalities in York County looked hopeful after an initial meeting at King Township office attended by representatives of two townships and three townships last week.

Reeve William Hodgson welcomed officials from Aurora, Newmarket, East Gwillimbury and Whitechurch. They discussed with King Township Council the advisability of combining police coverage.

Councillor Gordon Cook, chairman of King's police committee, was chosen to represent King Township on the five-man committee, which will investigate costs of both proposed organizations.

It was not decided whether headquarters would be located in Aurora or Newmarket if all five municipalities share policing. In the event Aurora, King and Whitechurch form a three-part force, headquarters likely would be in Aurora.

East Gwillimbury, Newmarket and Aurora are protected by their own police departments at present. Whitechurch and King Townships have bylaw enforcement officers.

Both townships have had verbal assurance Ontario Provincial Police will continue to operate through the townships until next May, when it is proposed the Vandorf branch will be closed and the staff transferred.

Councillor Cook explained to "The Liberal", discontinuance of OPP service leaves King Township with two alternatives, joining with other municipalities or instituting a township force.

"Either way it is going to be costly and will affect next year's budget", he said. King Township supported the recent proposal, which was rejected by York County Council, for uniting 13 police forces in the county.
