Walls Up, Roofs On By End Of November

Satisfactory progress is being made in both construction of the new York Central Hospital at Richmond Hill and the addition to the York County Hospital at Newmarket reported Mr. Douglas Storms at a dinner meeting of representatives of county business firms held Wednesday of last week at the Summit Golf and Country Club, Jefferson. Mr. Storms is chairman of the York Central Hospital Association. He reported the walls are expected to be up and roofs on in both cases by the end of November. This will make winter construction possible.

Chairman of the meeting was Mr. Harold Pringle who is vice-president and secretary-treasurer of the Collis Leather Co. Ltd. of Aurora. Mr. Pringle is chairman of the county corporations committee. Head table guests included General Chairman Ray Marshall of Aurora, Mr. Storms, Mr. Stephen Roman, chairman of the national corporations committee, and Mr. Charles Boyd of Newmarket, chairman of the service clubs committee. Mr. W. A. Spear, chairman of the Board of Governors of York County Hospital will act as campaign treasurer.

Guest speaker of the evening was Dr. Hagar Hetherington of Kleinburg. Dr. Hetherington who is on the staff of St. Michael's and Sunnybrook Hospitals and the medical faculty of the University of Toronto, is a consulting physician in Richmond Hill.

By personal experience and with statistics he very vividly portrayed the need for additional hospital facilities in both the southern and northern part of the county. He forecast if the present population trend continues the building program now underway will be inadequate even before it is completed.

developing a third well near the present two. Test-drilling at the new site has revealed a good quality water is available for a deep well at 330 feet.

A minimum pumping capacity of 200 imperial gallons a minute has been assured, twice the guarantee of number two well.

Work is expected to start October 14 as village trustees anticipate rapid clearance by King Township Council and OMB for a debenture issue.

Trustee O'Reilly did not consider the importing of water would be feasible in the present emergency. He noted some higher sections of the village are getting "bubbly" water when at times air is pumped into the waterworks system.

In a bulletin headed "We Have No Water", ratepayers were cautioned that: "All commercial use of water has been stopped and schools are doing all they can, within health needs, to conserve water. It is now up to the individual user to stop and think twice, and then twice more before using any water for any purpose."

"If a pint will do the job, do not use a gallon, in fact, make sure that the job is essential."

"Your trustees are doing everything possible to speed the development of a further well. Only you can help yourself and your neighbors by squeezing all the use you can from every drop of water," it added.

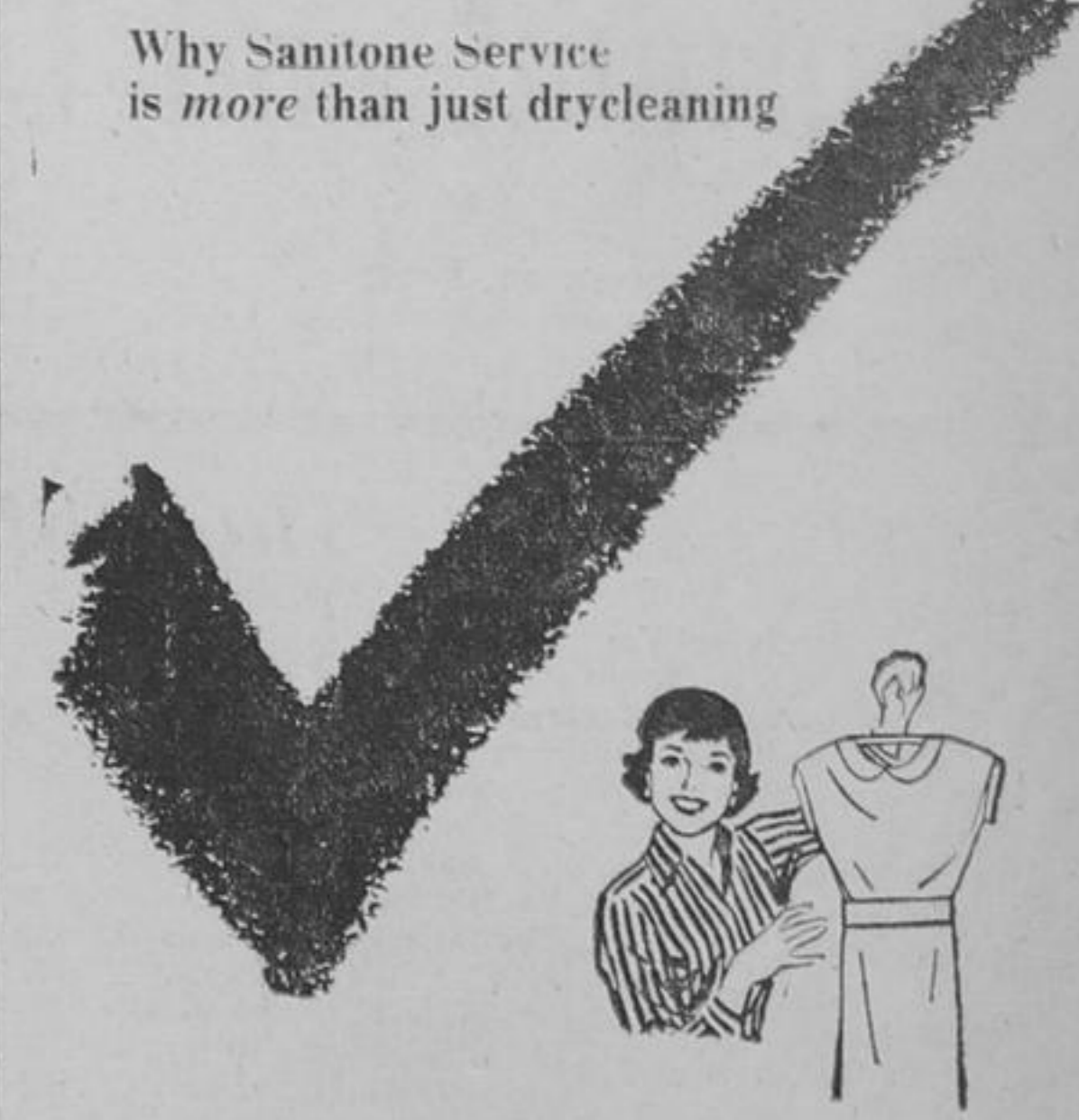
