(By Mrs. Loren Guild) Elisabeth Barker is the winningest girl and Headford is very proud of her achievements. Dairy Princess, 4-H delegate to Britain and now she is taking ploughing honors.

The largest number on record, 63 contestants, competed at the North York Ploughing match at Mount Albert, October 5. In the class of entries who had never won in any ploughing match, Elisabeth, in her first contest, came second for land and first for finish. There were five entries in this class. She drove a three furrow mounted plough.

Coached by her uncle, Leonard Wellman, Queensville, she attended the East York match the day before "to get the hang of the thing." Her happy comment was, "Well it was fun."

Elisabeth passed on the interesting information that the Ontario Ploughing matches were initiated in York County in 1844.
