Appoint A. G. Cusdin

Brings Extensive Background To New Position

King City Hydro Commissioners confirmed last week the appointment of Alfred George Cusdin as secretary-treasurer of the King City Hydro and Water Systems.

Mr. Cusdin commenced his full-time duties October 1 in the village office. In addition to being responsible for issuing bills, accounting and meter reading for the village hydro system, he has charge of the financial part of the waterworks and garbage collection.

It was announced the office adjoining the fire hall would be open afternoons

from 1 to 4.30 Mondays to Fridays for the payment of bills.

Mr. Cusdin started his new position with a background of considerable experience. On a larger scale he did similar work from 1923 to 1953, with the Metropolitan Water Board in London, England, in the Department of Treasurer and Comptroller (Revenue Section), with time out for war service.

Since 1953 he has been engaged in electronics with Avro and the Burrough's Corporation (defence systems service division). At Burrough's he served as instructor of digital data processing in connection with the continental defence system.

Recently at DeVry Electronics Institute on Lawrence Avenue, he instructed in radar, microwaves, computer fundamentals and technical writing.

In 1946 he completed four years in the Royal Navy, Fleet Air Arm, as radar technician with rank of petty officer. He saw much of the world at this time and served in the Mediterranean and East Indies areas.

Mr. Cusdin is well-known for his work as lay minister of the King circuit of Baptist Churches in King City, Pottageville and Kettleby. He has lived at the King St. parsonage since undertaking lay duties five years ago. His village job will not alter his leading the Sunday church services and mid-week group activities.

Fifteen applications for the position were received by village trustees from Scarborough, Richmond Hill, Toronto, King City and as far as North Bay.
