Council Briefs

Changes in the police committee's policy for personnel taking days off in lieu of statutory holidays were revealed to town council Monday night in a report tabled by the committee.

It is now mandatory for employees working shifts to take their day off within one month of the statutory holiday.

Those not working shifts must wherever practical take the actual holiday but if service demands otherwise the holiday shall be taken within seven days, the committee has ruled.

The committee has also ruled that Police Chief R. P. Robbins may not take a vacation period extending longer than two weeks at any one time.

A new structure of "Stop Streets" will be established as soon as construction is completed on Newkirk Road. Libby Boulevard and Altamira Road are two streets under consideration, council was told by Police Committee Chairman Al White.

Richmond Hill will study anti-noise bylaws used by neighboring municipalities as a guide to drawing up one of their own, the report revealed.

Chief Robbins was authorized to advertise for a police cadet to handle office duties at the station. Appointment of the successful candidate is to be effective November 1.

Council approve a request from the Royal Canadian Legion, Richmond Hill branch, for permission to hold their annual Poppy Day November 10 and the evenings of November 8 and 9 at all shopping centres in town.

Authorization was granted the Boy Scouts to hold their "Apple Day" October 20 in town.

Referred to the police committee for study was information from the town solicitor that the CNR would not oppose any move to have whistling stopped at level crossings within the town limits providing the crossings are suitably marked.

Only crossing not marked is the one on Elgin Mills Side-road.

Council had previously complained to the railway of excessive whistle blowing by trains passing through town.

Reeve F. R. Perkins informed council he had received several complaints about busses stopping at Centre Street on the east side of Yonge.

He was informed by Transportation and Parking Committee Chairman John MacDiarmid that schedules were still being ironed out and it was only a temporary measure.

Some trouble has been experienced on passengers transferring from one bus to another, Mr. MacDiarmid said.

He also revealed he had received four letters from passengers suggesting ways to improve the service and intimated he would be pleased to receive more.

Light Was Green Both Drivers Say After Collision

Installation of traffic lights at the intersection of the Gormley townline and Don Mills Road failed to prevent a collision Sunday afternoon.

Police say both Stanley Briggs driver of a car travelling northbound on Don Mills Road, and Wilfred Pielsticker, driver of an eastbound car on the Gormley townline, claim they drove through a green light.

Briggs, 62, of R.R. 3, Meaford, escaped uninjured. His wife, Rita received abrasions to her left leg, knee and a twisted left ankle. The Briggs car is a total wreck, police say.

Police estimate the damage to the right side of Pielsticker's car at about \$450. Pielsticker, 31, his wife Hildegard, and 2½-year-old Ralph, all escaped without injury.

No charges have been laid.
