## Report Decrease In Water Usage At King City

A decrease in the amount of water being used daily in King City indicates residents co-operated with the recent waterworks bulletin distributed by the fire brigade, urging careful conservation.

Gradually the rate of consumption dropped from 85,000 gallons to a new low of 65,000 a day.

Stories were heard of a housewife who saved a pail of laundry rinse water to clean the car, while another did not let the dish water go down the drain until it had been used to wash the cellar steps.

One woman laughingly admitted she saved the vegetable water - for bathing her feet.

Whatever the method of conservation, village trustees commended residents for conserving the limited water available.

Hopes for solving the water problem are being pinned on the early development of a deep well by International Water Supply Company, which has been engaged for the past two years by trustees in a \$9,000 test-drilling program.
