

Dial Changeover Ends Toll Cost To Hill, Gormley

Changeover from manual to dial service becomes effective Sunday in Unionville, Markham, Stouffville and Clarendon. These exchanges were also added to the direct distance dialing network.

Switchover means that long distance charges between Richmond Hill and Gormley will be eliminated.

"Introduction of dial service in this group of exchanges brings an end to manual telephone service in the Toronto district," W. C. Barnes, Bell Telephone manager for the area said.

"Thus ends a program started in 1924 when the first dial telephone was placed in service in Toronto," he added.

Conversion of Toronto City's telephones to dial system came in 1936. Dial service was introduced in Richmond Hill in 1952.

At the same time, Mr. Barnes announced that over 6,000 copies of the 1962 Aurora-Newmarket - Richmond Hill telephone directory will be distributed in the Richmond Hill area this year.

A sketch of Pickering College, Newmarket, is on this year's turquoise cover.

Total distribution of directories this year is 45,100, compared to 42,800 last year.

Bill Kincaid, 70, of Oxford Street, Richmond Hill, a passenger in the Last car required 30 stitches to close lacerations to his head. Last suffered lacerations to the chin.

The parked car belonged to Alex Gardiner of Georgetown. Police are still investigating.

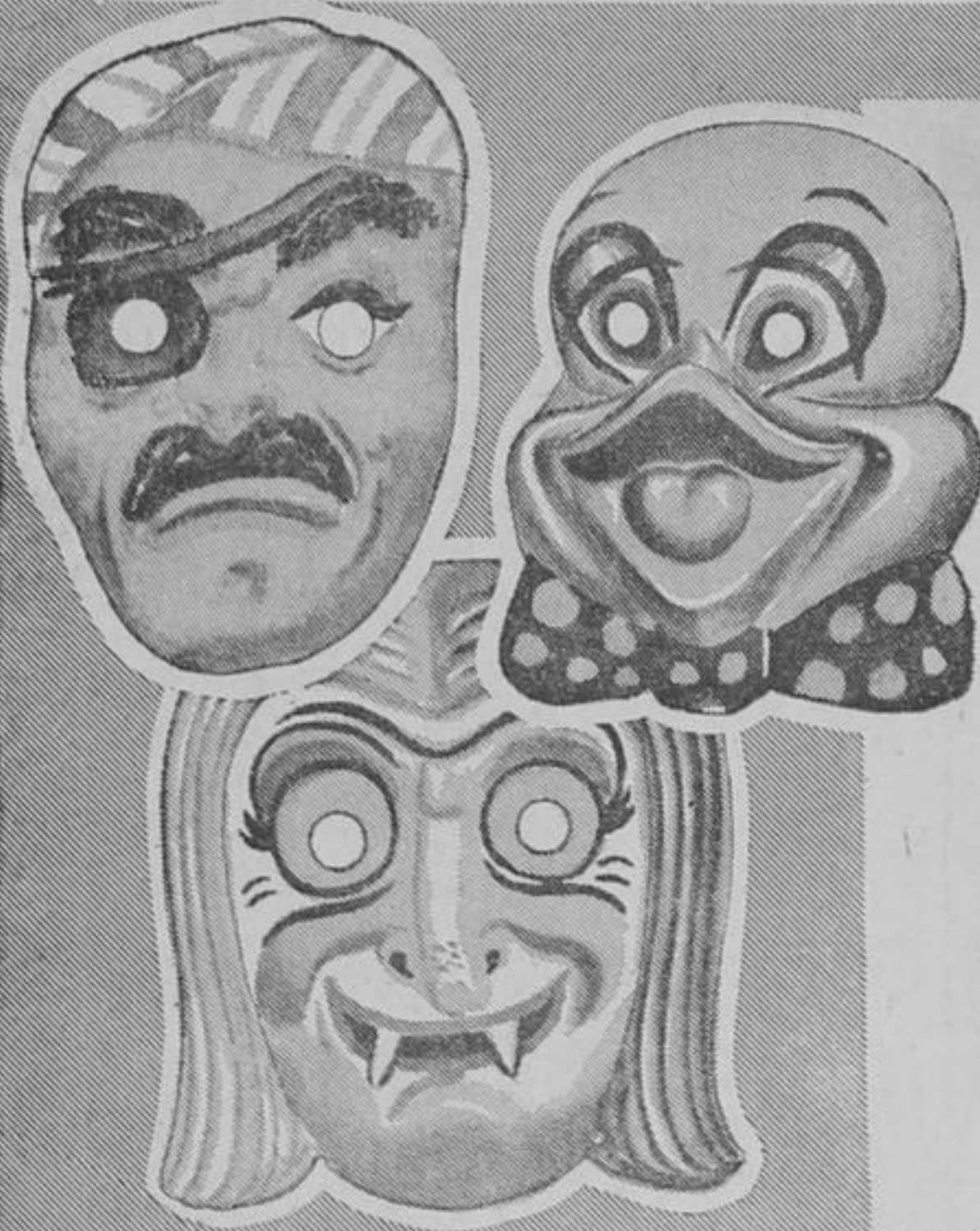
