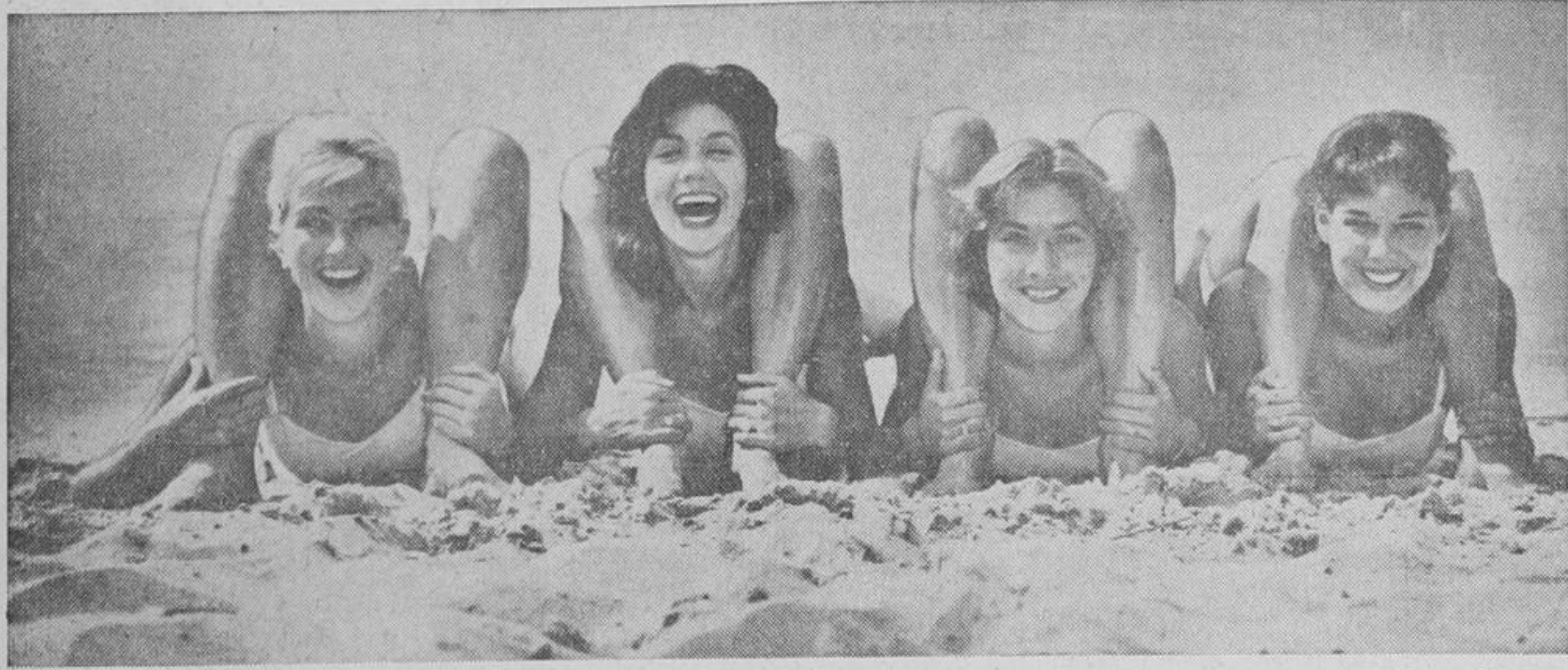


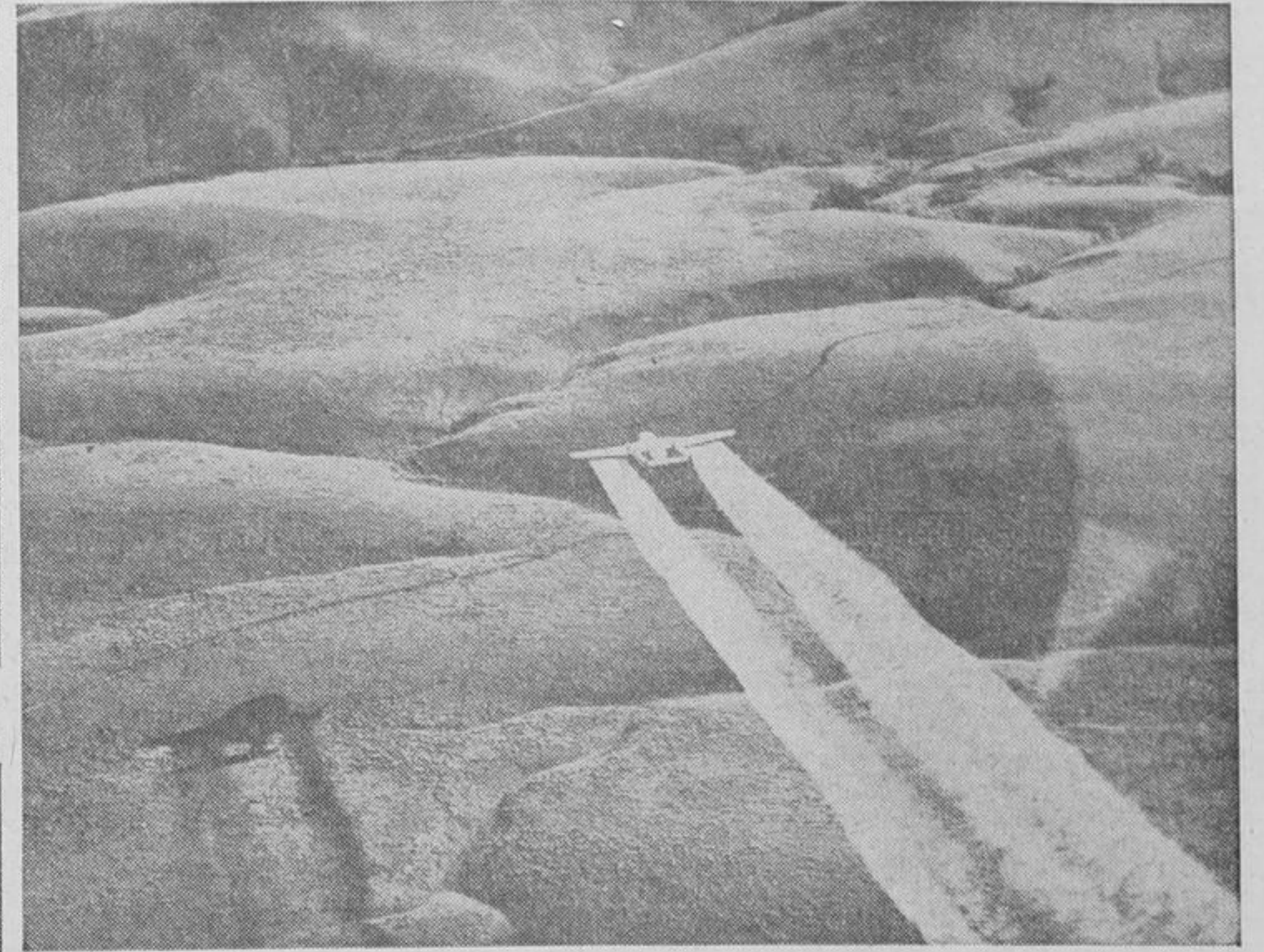

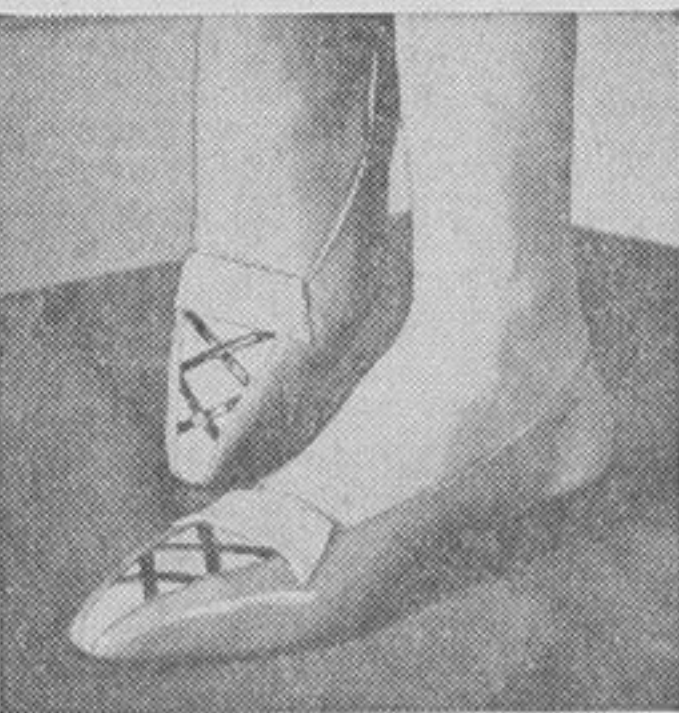

Heel-Bent For Fall

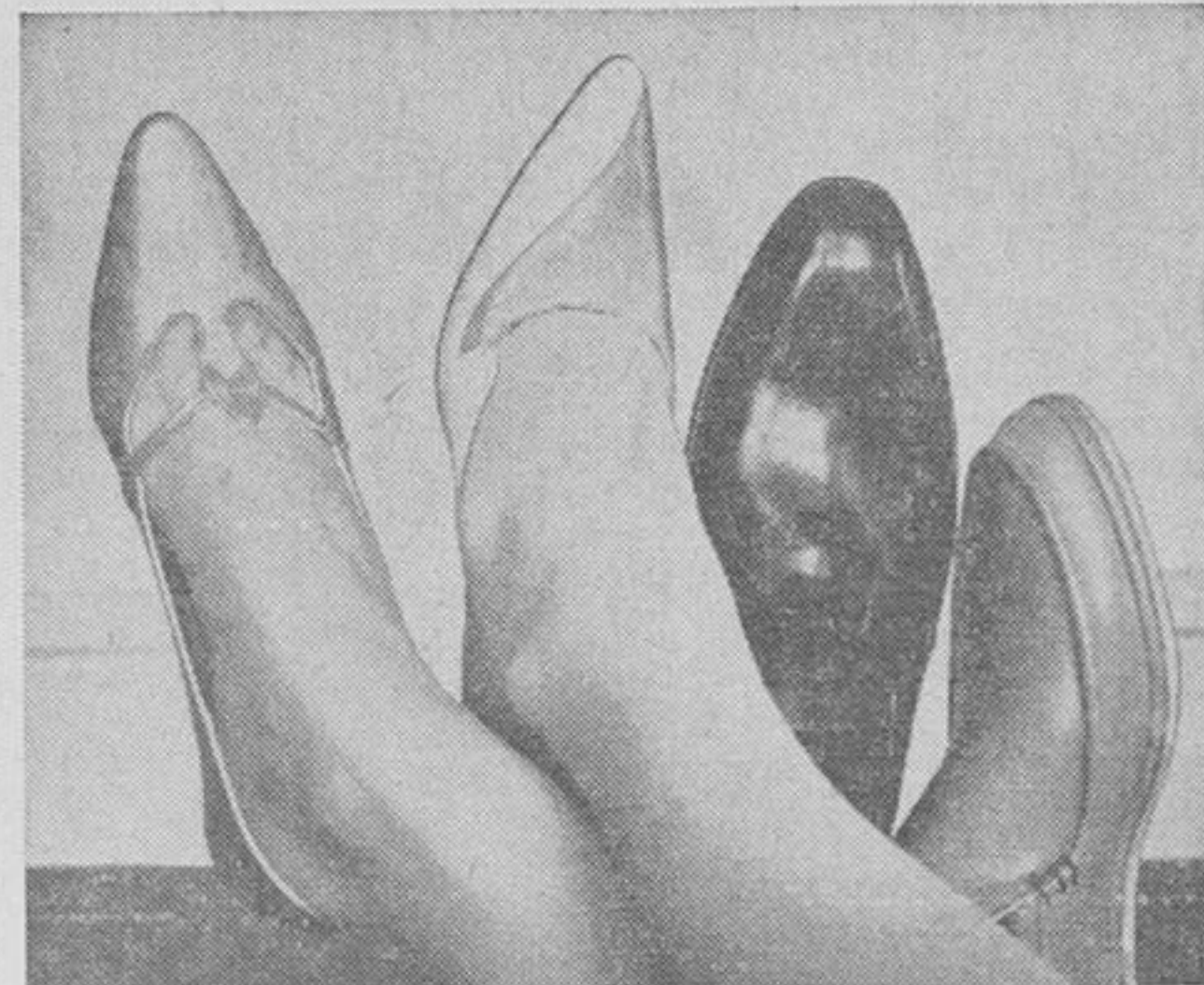

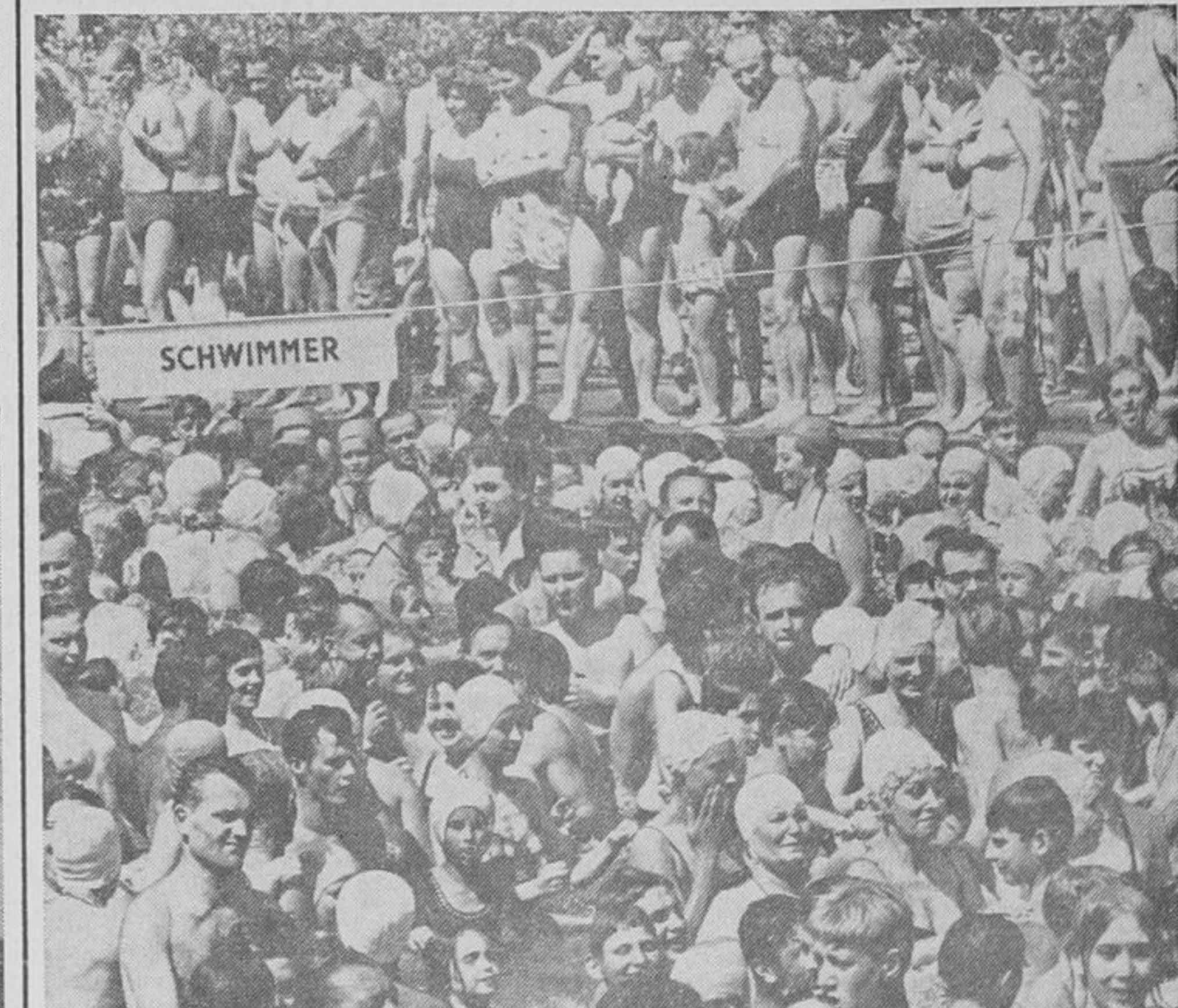
