Right at the moment everyone is pulling in a different direction, and instead of helping each other to progress are busily tossing hurdles in each other's way. An over-all committee, with representation from each group, is a definite need for the future before the whole organization collapses under the weight of charges and counter-charges, invectives, innuendos and insults. Then maybe adults can start acting like adults and each one learn to recognize the needs of the other. Then and only then will the entire ball program be the fine organization it could and should be. May they get together real, real soon!
