Faithful Church Worker W. Scrivener Dies At 92

The funeral of the late William J. Scrivener was held last Friday afternoon and was largely attended by relatives and friends. Mr. Scrivener died November 7 after an illness of a few weeks, and in his passing Richmond Hill and district lost one of its oldest and most dearly loved citizens.

"Bill" Scrivener as he was popularly known to young and old was in his 92nd year, but until his recent illness was a man of unusual physical vigor and mental alertness. He was a kindly man, friendly and warm hearted, and his host of friends join with "The Liberal" in extending sincerest sympathy to the bereaved family.

Following a private service at the Pipher Funeral Home, the funeral service was held in St. Mary's Anglican Church of which the deceased was a long-time faithful and devoted member. Rev. J. F. O'Neil, the Rector was assisted by Rev. J. R. F. Moore and Rev. Fred C. Jackson. Rev. J. F. O'Neil paid a well deserved glowing tribute to Bill Scrivener who, he said would be remembered always for his goodness and his faithfulness. "His was a long and a good life" said the Rector "and it was marked by faithfulness". Wherever he lived Mr. Scrivener was a good churchman. For seven years he held the office of Church Warden at St. Mary's and for many years was sexton. In sincere tribute it was said that in all these years he was always a strong right arm to the Rector, in carrying on the work of the parish.

The late William James Scrivener was born in York Township a son of Mr. and Mrs. James Scrivener, and was the last surviving member of a family of six. In early life he farmed in the Weston area of Vaughan Township and in 1924 moved to Richmond Hill. He was for many years active as a painter and decorator and took under the auspices of the Parish a keen interest in community and church life. An enthusiastic member of Richmond Hill Lawn Bowling Club he took part in games on the local green during the past season.

The day was organized by district Ontario Public School inspectors for the benefit of approximately 550 teachers in the municipalities of Richmond Hill, Vaughan, Markham, Woodbridge, King and Aurora.

An interest in public health nursing prompted Miss Knox to spend last year studying a course in that subject at University of Toronto and to seek a career in VON nursing.

Richmond Hill's VON is a voluntary organization under a board of managers representing the town's various service groups. Mrs. Margaret Southwell represents council on the board.

VON is a home-nursing program, providing care for shut-ins and new mothers and babies. A set fee of \$2.50 per call is charged but people who have a limited income pay only as

much as they are able. "I picked this type of work because it is a warmer type of nursing," Miss Knox explained. "You get to know your patients."

In India, Miss Knox's parents worked in a remote village populated by illiterate natives. She emphasized however, that India is a polyglot of people of all classes and levels of education, with a far wider spectrum than here in Canada.

Many Indians are coming to Canada now to further their education, she said.

Miss Knox did not comment on the undeclared war being waged by China and India although she did attend a school in a part of the Himalayas where fighting is going on.

Adjustment to Canada came fairly easy for Miss Knox although she recalls being very frightened during a furlough visit to her parents' native Ireland. "I had never seen so many white people before in my life," she explains.

Miss Knox succeeds Miss Edith Woodbryne.

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Candidate Walter Scudds Protests Any Sale Of Newkirk Rd. Greenbelt

In a statement made public this week Ward 1 Candidate Walter Scudds went on record as strongly opposing any move by town council or its parks board to sell the greenbelt area on Newkirk Road for residential development. The parks board has recommended council sell the land for more housing and use the money for the purchase of park land elsewhere. The Newkirk Rd. greenbelt lies in Ward 1. Mr. Scudds resides in the Ward at 295 Bluegrass Blvd.

In his statement Candidate

Scudds said "in the Beverley Acres-Birchview Village area we have the largest and the most thickly concentrated area of population in town. The only parkland in the ward is a small parkette on Neal Drive and another at the corner of South Taylor Mills Dr. and Newkirk Road. The main parkland in the area was sold by council for the Beverley Acres School. I shall certainly do everything I can to stop any move to sell our greenbelt for more housing."
