By-LAW NO. 1074 A By-law to Amend By-law No. 1000

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Town of Richmond Hill that By-law No. 1000 be and it is

hereby amended as follows:

1. By adding to Section 8 the following paragraph:

"5. Alternatively to the provisions set forth in Schedule "B" relating to corner lots and reversed corner lots.

The front yard of a lot having a onefamily detached dwelling shall have a minimum front yard of 12 feet provided there is a minimum side yard on the flankage street of 25 feet and provided that any garage or accessory building fronts on the flankage street and provided the minimum distance between the front of any garage or accessory building and the flankage street is 25 feet."

2. This By-law shall come into effect on the day it is passed by Council subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.


