Request Change From Residential Agriculture

Executors of Leitchcroft Farms have asked Markham Township Council to change the zoning of their property in a proposed new official plan from

residential to agricultural. Proposed zoning in the area calls for a density of eight people per square mile, in the southwestern part of the town-

ship. Reeve Wilfred Dean told representatives of Chartered Trust. executors of the estate, the

township was trying to attract assessment through estate type homes, rather than through industry. George Tiviluk, solicitor for

Chartered Trust, claimed the market for such homes is not as good. He suggested that part of the area (Leitchcroft Farms) remain agricultural until the township had an indication of how strong the demand for these homes was.

He warned it would be difficult to change the density once the area had been developed. Ratepayers who bought homes on the basis of the more exclusive zoning would not be happy if density was raised, he said.
