King City Notes

Twenty members attended the November 13 meeting of King City Women's Institute held at the home of Mrs. Robert Innes, Con. 3.

Detailed reports were given by Mrs. Ross Walker and Mrs. Harold Ratcliff, delegates to the area convention in Toronto this month.

They returned with the request to make resolutions more concise. No resolutions had been submitted from the King group this year, but others were considered at the convention.

One resolution was passed, asking the Ontario government to investigate applying a substitute for salt on roads, because of the resulting damage to cars.

Delegates also favored contacting the Canadian Consumer Association about clothing not on the proper list and which did not hang properly.

The resolution favoring support of the Peace Research Institute was rejected after members decided they could work instead through their own organization and support the United Nations.

Three letters were read in connection with the York hospital campaign, requesting canvassers, donations and the undertaking of hospital needs as long-term projects.

While several members volunteered to serve as canvassers, they decided against guaranteeing a group project for the present, owing to the limited treasury.

Second vice-president Mrs. E. J. Munroe presided. Roll call was answered by a game, in which vegetables were named.

Mrs. Howard Hayward spoke on the motto, "It is alright to pray for a crop, but keep on hoeing". Members took part in a quiz on popular slogans.

According to King Township officials, a public hearing regarding the CNR application to close the station at King City will be held November 27 at 8 p.m. in the village office at King City Fire Hall.

Representatives of the Board of Transport Commissioners, to whom the CNR made application, will conduct the hearing.

Few residents were aware a meeting had been called for November 6 at the King Station, when Reeve William Hodgson represented the views of township residents and businessmen.

Both King Township Council and King City Trustees had signified they would oppose the move to close "as an agency the station".

Ten pupils took part, reading a message from Governor-General George Vanier and verses of remembrance and thanksgiving for the freedom made possible by those who died.

In a memo to parents, Principal Carson Bice of Doris M. Patton School offers a word of caution about family pets.

"On several occasions this year, dogs have followed children to school. These may have been their own or may have belonged to a neighbor", Mr. Bice wrote.

"There is a possibility that although these dogs may be of a friendly, playful nature, in the excitement of playing with larger groups of children, some one may get bitten."

"We would ask your cooperation to see that your pet does not come to the school grounds. It is sometimes difficult and always annoying to attempt to establish ownership of the dogs, and our recourse, in the extreme, may have to be the notification of the canine control officer, in the general interest of the pupils."

King City Fire Brigade is taking a more active role than ever in assisting the Muscular Dystrophy Association in Toronto.

This week for the first time, about 20 firemen are conducting a house-to-house canvass to raise funds. Most of the money is directed toward research in 20 medical centres and universities. Some of the donations provide comforts, such as wheel chairs, for young patients.

At present, cause of muscular dystrophy is unknown. There is no cure, no prevention and no treatment to date. The commonest form occurs among children and leads to progressive wasting of muscles, hampering voluntary movement.

Experts throughout the world agree that only research into the disease can lead to a cure. The association was formed in 1954, when the International Firefighters' Union adopted the cause and offered its support.

In past years the village brigade raised money by placing canvasses in public buildings. This is their first canvass to contact all the ratepayers.

The local drive is directed by Chairman William Willoughby, a brigade volunteer.

King City's Teen toppers are planning a "Fall Wind-Up" dance for tomorrow evening, (November 23) in All Saints' Church hall.
