

Award 43 Scholarships And Prizes At Thornhill

A total of 43 scholarships and prizes were awarded at the eighth annual commencement exercises of Thornhill Secondary School last Friday. These included gold pins awarded for achieving over 75 per cent for five years to Ingrid Heinonen, Jerry Lazar, John Sproule and Maureen Wright and a silver pin for obtaining honours for four years awarded to Allan Aho.

The graduates, 42 of whom received honour graduation diplomas, 46 secondary school graduation diplomas and 15 secondary school commercial diplomas, were exhorted to "Stir things up and let's get going," by Mr. A. V. Pigott, B.A., who gave the commencement address.

"Yours is an age of tremendous excitement," he told the graduates. "When we call this a 'commencement' we really mean it at the present time. Jobs will change and you will have to be retrained and re-educated every five years. Industry, the home and the school must all take part." We must get more people to go further in useful courses, Mr. Pigott insisted and expressed the opinion that Canadians had had things too easy since the war and had grown soft. "In Sweden the schools are open even on Saturdays and students get their breakfast at school." Mr. Pigott stated that in spite of the extremely high figure of unemployed, 7 1/2% of the work force in 1962, there were eighty

Top student in the middle school Marilyn Clark walked off with three prizes. She was awarded the board of student senators prize for Grade 12, with an average of 84.3%, the Thornhill Lions Club scholarship for junior matriculation, and the York Central District High School Board's middle school general proficiency prize.

Other board of student senators' prizes - totalling over \$1,000 went to Inge Strauch, grade 9 commercial; Susan Brunner, grade 10 commercial; Joanne McHoull, grade 11 commercial; Jean Maw, grade 12 commercial; Allan Reoch, grade 10 general; Terry Lazar, grade 11 general; money for these prizes was raised by the students in the chocolate bar campaign.

Lower and Middle School Other Lower and Middle School prizes were presented as follows: to Robert Atkinson, the Buttonville Women's Institute prize for general proficiency in Grade 9 for an average of 82.3%; to Inge Strauch the Grade 9 special commercial history prize awarded by Mr. D. Foley; to Susan Brunner the Grade 10 special commercial history prize, also awarded by Mr. Foley; to Alita Wise and Mary Anne Baker the Bank of Nova Scotia prize for proficiency in middle school; also to

Mary Anne Baker the Gordon Lake Memorial prize for languages; to Allan Reoch with 83.5% in the general course and to Susan Brunner with 77.8% in the commercial course went the high school board's prize for lower school general proficiency; to Jean Maw the high school board's middle school general proficiency prize for the commercial course; and to Donna Thompson the Sims prize for greatest improvement in typing.

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When Thornhill Secondary School commencement exercises were held Friday evening Maureen Wright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Wright (formerly of this neighborhood and now of Ottawa), and Jean Maw, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Maw, were top students in their respective courses.

Each received a medal for achieving an average of 75 per cent or more through their entire years at the school. Maureen, who is now an honour student at Queen's, won the Morley Kinnee plaque for proficiency in Upper School English, the Mary Threapleton prize for English literature, and an Ontario Scholarship, as well as a gold pin for achieving 75 per cent or more for five years.

Honors for Jean Maw included the York Central High School Board award for General Proficiency (Middle School); 2nd prize in typing; and the Board of Student Senators' prize for Grade 12 Commercial. Jean also received a bronze plaque for achieving more than 75 per cent over a three year period. Her prizes amounted to more than \$60.

Mrs. George Hooper, acting for Mrs. Adam Brown, president of the Buttonville Women's Institute which awards a prize to the top student in Grade 9, made the presentation to Robert Atkinson.

Wesley Fierheller was an honor graduate and Brucette Tooley received her graduation diploma in commercial work.
