B. Of M. Reports Loans All Time High Of \$2,269 Million - Up 17.33%

Year-end records in loans, deposits and resources, plus new 900 offices at home and abroad were \$2,269 million, 17.33 per cent more than a year ago, and reflecting a year of intense credit demands. In contrast, the bank's securities portfolio was reduced 12.5 per cent, from \$1,107 million to \$969 million.

B of M resources were reported at \$4,015 million, a new year-end record, compared with \$3,950 million a year ago. Deposits increased from \$3,647 million to \$3,713 million. Personal savings, amounting to \$1,384 million, are up by \$85 million.

Earnings, after taxes, for the year were \$1,820 million, or 47.85 per cent of the bank's public liabilities of \$3,803 million, compared with \$1,365 million in 1961, an increase of 4.46 per cent, and an indication of continuing branch modernization and extension.

Valuation of bank premises is shown at \$65,878,133, compared with \$63,062,983 in 1961, an increase of 4.46 per cent, and an indication of continuing branch modernization and extension.

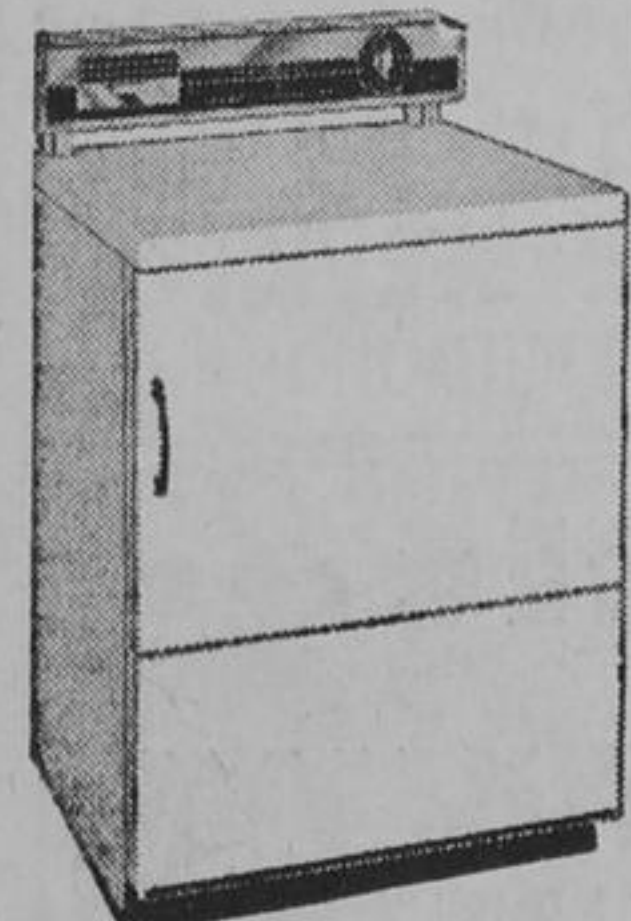
