

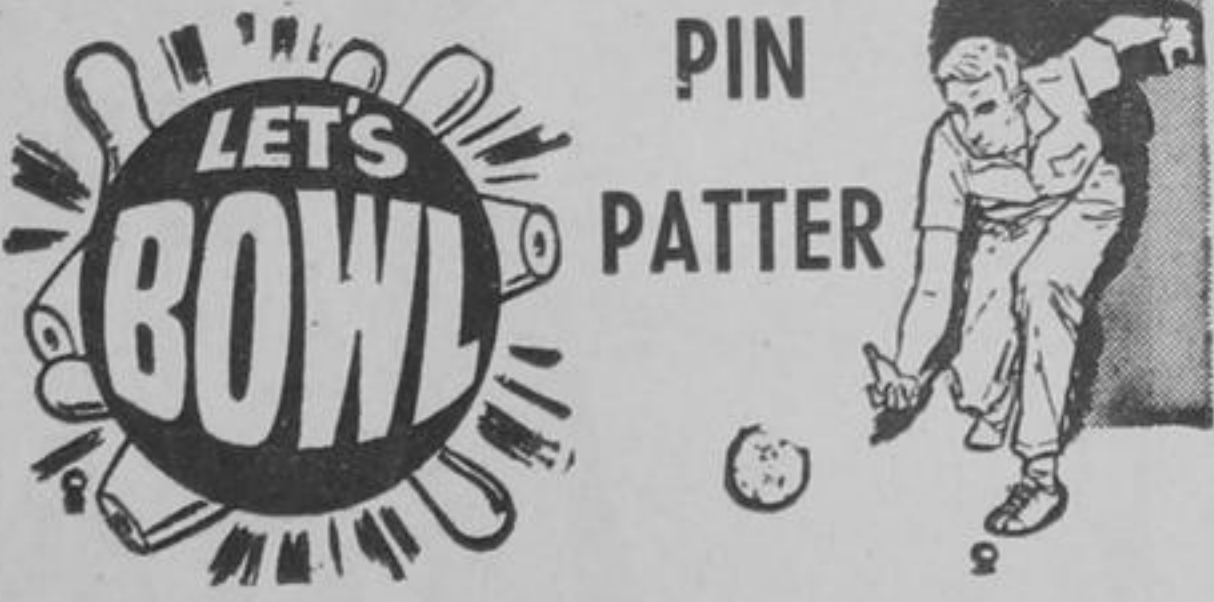

Oil Installation Meets Opposition
An application from E. J. Williams to install fuel oil storage tanks at Highway 7 and Ruggless Ave., Langstaff, was rejected by Markham Township Council, Monday afternoon. Before officially rejecting the application, council heard George Jacobson of Langstaff, present a petition bearing names of 122 ratepayers, opposing approval of the installation. Rejection of the plan came in council's adoption of part of a committee report on the matter. Eight residents appeared at Monday's meeting. Application was for two 10,000 gallon underground fuel tanks and one 2,000 gallon gas tank. Council also received a telegram from BP (Canada) asking for postponement of any decision on the application. Mr. Williams was to have acted as a distributor for the firm in the area. BP asked for an opportunity to have a hearing before council. Later the same afternoon council refused an application for a license to operate a storage yard on Cedar Avenue to Carmo Carbello. Residents have complained to council that Mr. Carbello was operating a salvage yard. Council's rejection of the license application means he can be prosecuted for operating without a license.

Charges Pending In Auto - Truck Crash
An accident Saturday evening at Markham Road and Bayview Avenue in Richmond Hill resulted in \$1,500 damage, police estimate. 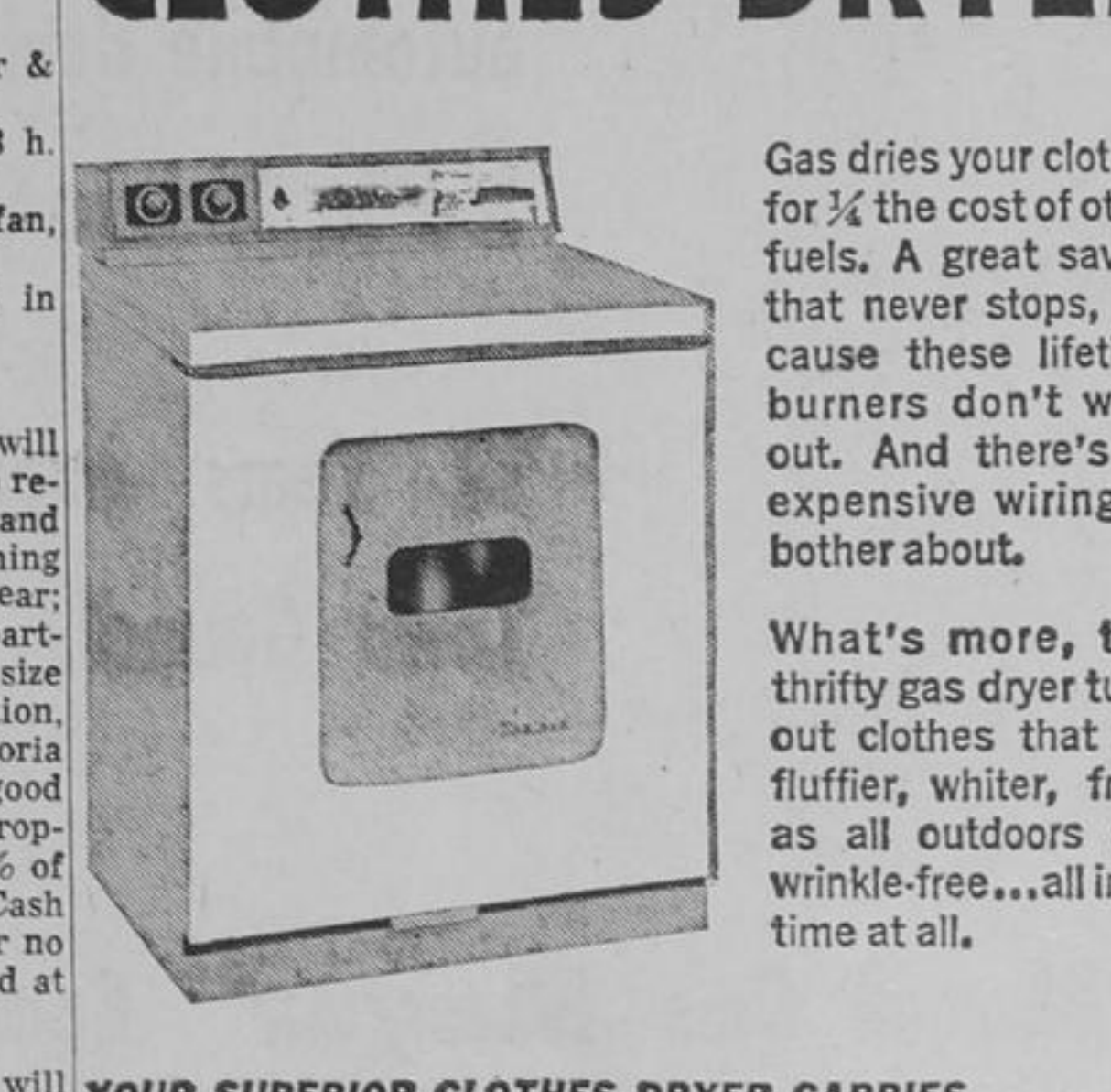

Area Codes Speed Long Distance Calls
Beginning December 2, the Area Code for long distance calling to the Ontario communities of Peterborough, Lindsay, Beaverton and surrounding centres changes to 705. When calling long distance you'll find it helps to know the Area Code for the community you wish to reach. North America has been divided into Numbering Plan Area (NPA) for long distance purposes, and each NPA is identified by a three-figure Area Code. Area Codes for many centres on this continent are listed in the introductory pages of your telephone directory. Richmond Hill, for instance, together with Toronto, Hamilton, Oshawa, St. Catharines, etc., is in the 416 area. Anyone outside of the area calling you should associate this Area Code with your number. If for example, they were calling the Richmond Hill telephone number 884-8500, they should consider the full number as 416-884-8500. The same principal applies to calls we make outside our NPA (Long distance calls placed within the Numbering Plan Area do not require the Area Code). Those who dialed their own long distance calls by Direct Distance Dialing find it saves time if they know the Area Code of the place they're calling. Also if you place long distance calls through an operator, you'll find it goes through smoother if you give the Area Code. May we suggest that you give your Area Code along with your telephone number to your out-of-town friends and business acquaintances. It will help to speed their calls to you.
